

SAGINAW'S WINNING STREAK BROKEN BY DOLLY GRAY'S MEN

Flint Lands On Gillenwater in Eleventh Session.

HURONS ON THE BOTTOM

Hamilton Takes Second From Brantford.

SAGINAW, Mich., Aug. 16.—Flint broke Saginaw's winning streak of seven straight games Tuesday by taking the second game of the series, 10 to 7, in 11 innings. It was a free-hit game, Saginaw's pitcher, Dolly Gray, was hit for five runs and as many runs in the eighth. Saginaw tied it in the ninth on Dolly's single, Dolly's triple and Dolly's sacrifice fly but Flint won in the eleventh on four hits, two of which with a base on balls came with the Flint pitcher, Dolly Gray, on the left field fence in the fourth. Up to the sixth inning Gillenwater had pitched 21 innings without allowing a run and 19 without being scored on.

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GERMAN MARK IS AGAIN AWAY DOWN

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—German marks today declined to 1.05c in the local foreign exchange market, an overnight drop of 10 1/2 points or within a small fraction of the lowest price since the war.

Dealers in exchange ascribed the steady depreciation of marks to heavy selling by German interests at various European capitals.

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MORE WRITS ISSUED AGAINST THE SUN

TORONTO, Aug. 16.—Two more parliamentary writs have entered action at Osgoode Hall against the Farmers' Sun, each claiming \$50,000 for alleged libel. With the action entered a few days ago by Edmund Bristol, M.P., this makes a total of \$150,000 so far asked by way of reparation. As some eight or ten more writs have been entered, there is a possibility of actions totalling some \$500,000.

The writs issued this morning were on behalf of Senator M. J. O'Brien and Ottawa and J. P. Chaplin, M.P. of St. Catharines.

The alleged libel was published on May 25 last, and alleged that eight or ten members of parliament had divided \$1,200,000 between them as the result of a deal whereby Canada loaned credit to Rumania.

The article alleged that Senator O'Brien, as director of the Renfrew Woolen Mills, had received \$44,041, and that Mr. Chaplin, as director of the Wolland Vale Company, had made \$137,234.

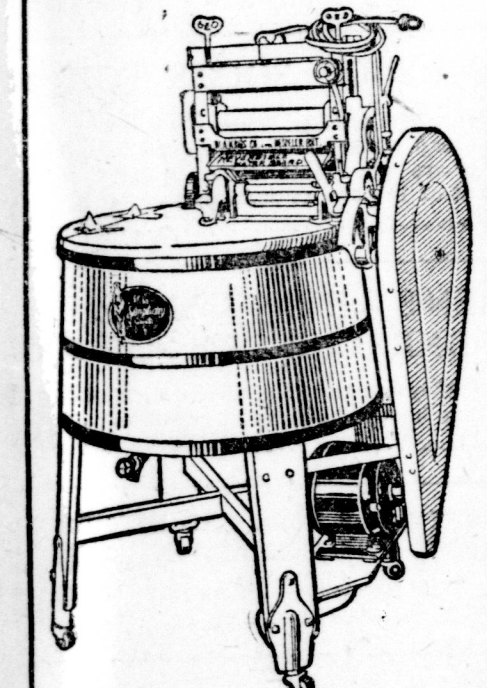

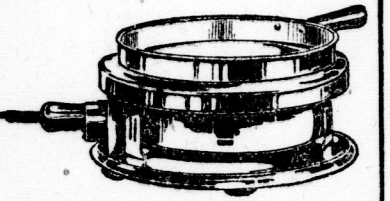
