### ORDERS BOARD TO RECONSIDER **BOOST IN RATES**

Dominion Cabinet Acts Following Appeal by Dairy Council.

AFFECTS CREAM DEALERS

Producers Claim Express Charges Are Destroying Profits.

OTTAWA, March 19 .- (By Canadian Press).-Further consideration of the increase of 20 per cent in commodities rates allowed to the express complaints by the express rates judgment of the board of railway commissioners in February, 1921, is ordered by the cabinet as the result of the appeal against the increased rates on cream made by the National Dairy Council. The board is asked to consider the question of a reduction in the rates on cream, and also whether in view of the fact that cream is only one commodity affected by the 20 per cent increase in the "commodites rate," a general reduction in these commodities rates can be made.

The appeal of the dairy council was heard by a committee of the cabinet on February 25, and was for the re-nioval of the increase of 20 per cent n express rates on cream granted by dairy council, through D'Arcy Scott, submitted that owing to the falling the market value of cream since the time the increase was not making any profit on their cream, would make all the difference between profit and loss in their case.




