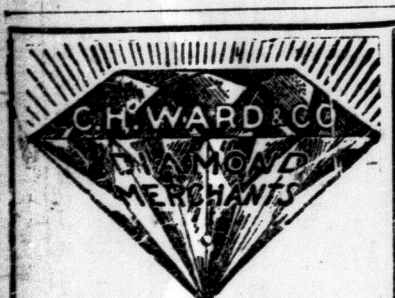

URGES WHEAT BOARD AS AID FOR FARMERS

Peter W. Fair Describes Problems Confronting Growers in Western Canada.

HIGHER PRICES SOUGHT

Prairie Cultivators Frequently Have To Sell Crop At Sacrifice Prices.

That the farmers of the West are positively in need of some such assistance as a wheat board would bring to them, is the firm belief of Peter W. Fair of this city, who for some years farmed a half-section in Southern Saskatchewan, and whose son, Thomas Fair, is working the other half-section adjoining his father's. Mr. Fair went to the West in 1881, leaving a farm in Brantford Township, six miles from Brantford. "I have seen it many times," stated Mr. Fair to The Advertiser, "twice in the fall of the year a farmer would be visited by an agent, stating that it was necessary that he (the farmer) should pay off a note held against him by the banks or some of the implement people, at the same time stating that if this were not done the bailiff would be on the job. The farmer has bills to pay at a number of points—the provision man has been carrying him, and he has the banks and the machinery people to deal with.

Has To Sacrifice Crop.

"The result is that he is forced to rush his grain off to the market at a time when it is glutted and the price down. After it gets into the hands of the elevator men they have the necessary backing to hold it until the market is better. That is one of the curses of farming in Western Canada. It is a great country, and should be the greatest poor man's country on top of God's footstool, but it is necessary that we have some action to protect the man who is spending his life on that vast expanse, and see to it that he gets all that can be secured for him. The men out there do not expect that wheat board would be able to get \$1.25 a bushel for wheat if the market price was \$1, but when you see some of the conditions you will understand why it is so important that every last cent shall go to the man who grows the grain.

Long Way To Market.

"Down where my land is, we are some 18 miles from the border. We are 35 miles from a railway station, and it takes three days to draw the grain there to the elevator. When I was certain that we were out at the end of the world, but I soon found out that there were men who had to travel with their loads for a day before they ever reached my place, and it took them five days to take grain to market. Then the threshing of grain takes money. The threshing outfits there for the most part feed and house their own men, and also draw the grain in from the fields. But the charge is 20 cents a bushel, and in the years of the war it was up as high as 25 cents in some districts. But it is a good district, for right next to me is a young Scotchman who went in there on a shoe string, and worked harder and longer than any man I ever knew. Last year he had 2,500 bushels of grain on 100 acres, while below us a bit were three big Swedes who took 7,500 bushels off 300 acres. So you see the land will grow grain, and it should go ahead rapidly if the conditions of marketing the produce were fair to the farmer.

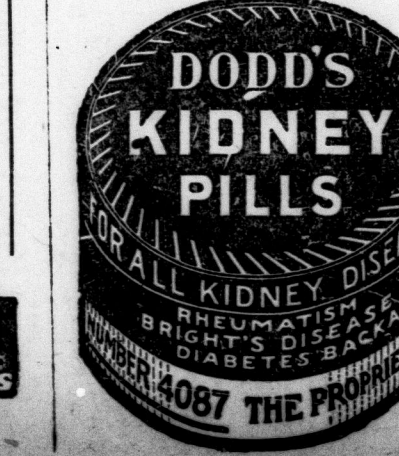
Lost Out On Cattle.

Mr. Fair relates an experience his son had with cattle following the war. "All the agricultural papers were pointing out that the cattle of Europe had been eaten up or killed during the war, and for that reason there must be a good market for cattle there for some years to come. The banks in the West were willing to advance money for this purpose, so my son went in, and before long had a herd of 25 of the finest steers you could see at any farm. When the time came to market them they were shipping cattle from Swift Current and other points to Winnipeg, and it was almost impossible to get enough to pay the freight on them, while the price was so low for cattle the men who were selling meat in Winnipeg seemed to have never heard that the war was over. There was a lot of money lost there, and we thought at the time the government, through its department of trade and commerce, should have been able to give us better advice, as we lost a lot of good money and a lot of hard work to boot."

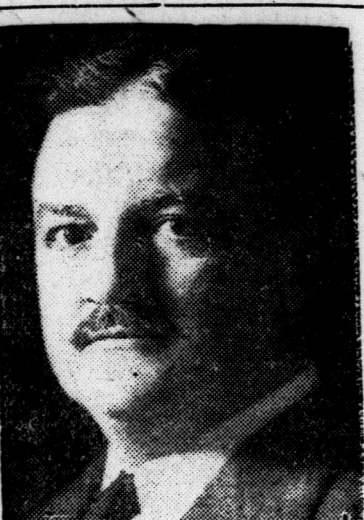
Remembers the Rebellion.

Mr. Fair went West first with a surveying party headed by his brother from Brantford, in 1881, and laid out a number of town sites. "Some of them grew," laughed Mr. Fair, "and some of them have been growing grain crops since. At the time of the Reil rebellion we put our teams at the service of the government and were on the trail between several of the posts there carrying mail. He was also in the Crow's Nest Pass when the first C. P. R. line was being built there by Mann & Maddigan. Mann being now Sir Donald Mann.

Hon. W. C. Kennedy's Condition Critical.



MONTREAL, Sept. 20.—Hon. W. C. Kennedy, federal minister of railways, was operated on for the second time at the Royal Victoria Hospital here today. A consultation of surgeons following the minister's failure to convalesce from his earlier and minor operation, determined upon a second which was performed today.

Mr. Kennedy's condition is said to be serious, although every hope is entertained for his recovery.

DENT GUILTY ON MURDER CHARGE

Prisoner Displays No Sign of Emotion On Hearing Verdict.

Counsel For Defense Makes Stirring Appeal For Acquittal.

BULLETIN.
Brantford, Sept. 21.—Chief Justice Meredith this morning sentenced Harry Dent, Armenian, to be hanged on Friday, Nov. 24, for the murder of his landlord, Peter Egoian, on April 24 last.

BRANTFORD, Sept. 20.—"Gentlemen of the jury, what is your finding?" asked W. A. Holmraque, K.C., of the jury, as the foreman stood to deliver the verdict in the murder of Peter Egoian.

"Guilty," said Foreman H. J. H. Williamson.

"Guilty of what?" asked Chief Justice Meredith as he sat forward in his chair towards the jury.

"Guilty of murder in the first degree," responded Foreman Williamson after a slight pause.

After being out of the courtroom for a period of 1 hour and 45 minutes, the jury returned a verdict of guilty in the case of Harry Dent for the murder of Peter Egoian on or about April 25, 1922.

Silent and emotionless sat Harry Dent in the prisoners' box, where he had spent many trying hours listening to the evidence.

Makes Stirring Appeal.

W. S. Brewster, K.C., his legal adviser, made a very stirring appeal to the jury for the acquittal of Dent. Mr. Brewster, in addressing the jury, stoutly declared that the crown could not prove the fact that Egoian had been murdered, as was alleged. He on many occasions referred to the feud that was going on around the country at the present time, inferring that Egoian might have been the victim of the gang.

The crown had not shown any motive for the crime.

He declared there was nothing more against Dent than the cashing of the \$200 check from the city. Mr. Brewster maintained that there was no other motive but this one, and that it was not sufficient to prove that Harry Dent had committed the crime. He commented very strongly upon Dent's war record in the Canadian English and Armenian armies.

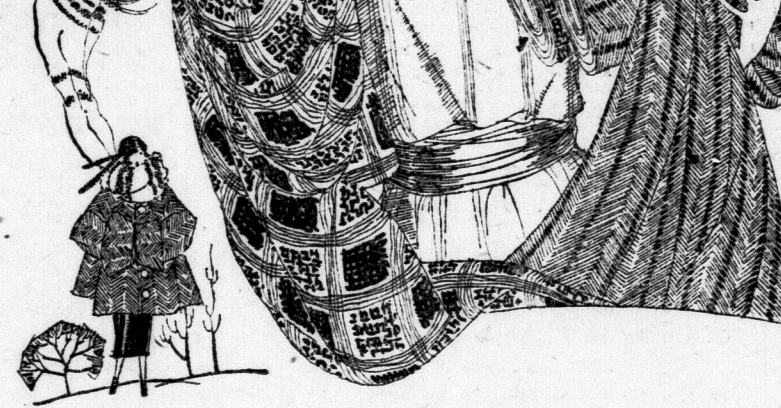
He told the jury that he had seen evidence that were in Dent's possession, and wound up by making a stirring appeal for British justice for Dent.

Sums Up Prosecution.
Sir William Hearst, K.C., in summing up the prosecution, spoke of the check being cashed by Dent at the Bank of Montreal. He did not credit Dent's statements about Egoian owing him (Dent) money. A strong chain of evidence had been welded around Dent link by link until it formed an unbreakable chain.

He made reference to the way that Dent had tried to bury or dispose of the remains of Egoian without giving them a decent burial. He commended the police very highly for their good work in presenting the case in the manner that they had during the trial. He did not credit the story of Dent that George Alexander had committed the murder, and he stated that it was a put-up job "to get" Alexander, because when the later appeared Dent denied that it was Alexander, and described a man who was totally different from the description given to Detectives Stanley and Boylan three days after the crime had been committed.

He did not believe that any man by the name of Bazonian existed, except in Dent's imagination. Sir William made reference to Dent's service overseas, but said that this should not be taken into consideration. "You have a solemn duty to perform and no matter what the cost,

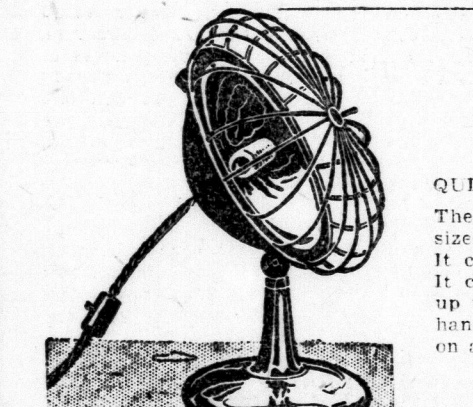
