



Member Fears Lower Tariff On Farm Implements Will Ruin Industry.

WARNS GOVERNMENT

Robert Forke Again Promises Liberals Support of Progressive Party.

Canadian Press Despatch.
Ottawa, March 13.—W. G. Raymond, Liberal member for Brantford, in the House today declared himself firmly opposed to any reduction in the tariff on agricultural implements. The present duty had reached an irreducable minimum, and, Mr. Raymond added, "I wish to say, and hope to make it plain enough, that no personal or party reasons will cause me to swerve from that determination."
Mr. Raymond is the third Liberal, who, during the debate on the ad-

who, during the debate on the ad-dress, has expressed his opposition to rumored tariff changes. He described Brantford as the home of agricultural implement manufacturers in Canada, and emphasized that hints in the speech from the throne had had the effect of paralyzing business, disuraging capital and throwing many aces into a turmoil of apprehension what might come down in the

"The government has often been kened to the ship of state, the chart and the compass, and so forth, and I have always had rather a liking for nautical terms and similes. would be satisfied when the duty was removed. They had not shown any tender consideration for the Conservative party, which had re-duced the duty in 1919 and was defeated at the polls in 1921. Attitude Inconsistent.

The attitude of the Progressives was inconsistent, inasmuch as they demanded the Hudson Bay railway, the construction of branch lines and other improvements, and apparently did not propose to contribute to their cost. Would removing the tariff from agricultural implements pay for building the Hudson Bay Railway? W. C.
