OPPONENTS OF SHIPS SUBSIDY **PREPARE**

British Vessel Owner Would Receive Over Million and Quarter Annually.

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—The text of the agreement between the governmen and Sir William Petersen, under the terms of which the latter agrees to establish and maintain a fleet of ten ships on the Atlantic in consideration of the annual payment of \$1,375,000 is published today.

Under the agreement, which bears the signatures of Hon. T. A. Low, minister of trade and commerce and Sir William Petersen, Sir William agrees to supply for the Canadian service a fleet of ten up-to-date new ships of the most modern type with all the latest known appliances for insuring economical, easy and cheap transportation and fitted in every respect for ocean service.

Some of these ships, it is stated are now in course of construction and all are to be approved by the British board of trade and are to have the highest classification of Lloyd's. Particulars and details of the ships are to be furnished to technical representatives of the govern nical representatives of the government for their approval.

The government agrees to pay Sir William Petersen an annual subsidy of \$1,375,000, "from the consolidated fund or other proper moneys in equal-installments at the end of each month (unless otherwise agreed upon between the contracting parties) in each year during the continuance of the agreement, the first monthly payment to become due and payable through increased production, hence its present policy of lower tayation one month after the commencement of the service." its present policy of lower taxation for raw products for basic indus-
