EDWARD BLAKE

The death of Mr. Blake recalls an important stage in the development of Canada, in which he was a large figure. He was a man of majestic intellectual powers—rather a broad and theoretic academic statesman than a politician. When Mackenzie could no longer lead, there was no one who could stand beside Mr. Blake for the leadership of the Liberal party. He was over-whelming in his eloquence, but had none of the merrymen of Sir John Macdonald nor the white plume bonhomie of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He came to a difference with his party not on the principle of free trade, but because he regarded the form in which reciprocity with the United States was proposed as unfair to Great Britain. If he was right in that judgment of the measure, he certainly is to be honored for his attitude towards it. His imperialism in that case should prove that it was with no lack of imperial patriotism, but the reverse, that he espoused the cause of home rule in Ireland. In fact his attitude in that was precisely analogous to the position he took when Premier of Ontario with regard to the relations that should exist between the provinces of Canada and the nation government. His attitude then was one of the strongest provincialism in matters that devolve upon the provinces. Nothing, he held, could do more to weaken the federal bond than any political interference of provincial government in national politics or of national governments in provincial politics. This as will be seen is a counsel of perfection that, from that day to this, has never been lived up to. As a speaker in the British Commons he seemed to the older members of the house like a "renewal" from the oratorical days of Burke, or at least of Macaulay, but it must be confessed that his chance for receiving a hearing other than critical and tolerant, was greatly curtailed by the unpopularity in the House of the cause he represented. He will always be remembered as a great and blameless patriot.

In last week's Tribune there appears what is called a joke on the Graphic. We regret to inform our readers that the point has not yet been discovered. Microscopic examination has failed to reveal even the slightest trace or semblance to a point so we must accept the Tribune's statement that it is a joke, as we accept all their statements and that is with a generous sprinkling of salt.

We do not consider it worth while replying to the irresponsible and empty vapors of a chronic sore-head, for, as we stated, already that a newspaperman's first duty is to be sure of his facts, it is clearly seen that in the case of the Editor of the Tribune "truth is found at the bottom of a well," and unfortunately when the editor of the Tribune pulls up the bucket from the well instead of the clear sparkling water of truth, he only manages to bring to the surface all the slime and mud of the bottom.

It would be much better for the Editor of the Tribune to get busy and pay his own debts when he might have some chance to talk of other people, and as this is our last word on the subject we might reiterate the old adage for the Tribune's special benefit—

"Those who live in glass houses should pull down the blinds."

Dear Sir:

In reading the report of the annual meeting of the Campbellton Board of Trade it struck me that the members of that body have overlooked a matter which in my humble opinion overshadows any other in so far as it has reference to the prosperity of the town, and that is a bridge across the Restigouche in the vicinity of Cross Point. The passenger and freight traffic across this river is such that if our public men had the welfare of our county at heart and would unite, they could demand a bridge and they would get it too. The storekeepers of your town complain about the people sending their money out of the country; why do they not agitate for a bridge? (I am speaking now for the people of Bonaventure Co.) and so make it easier for us to trade with them. We on our side of the river will do what we can, in fact we have already moved at the last meeting of the Municipal Council of the township of Mann I understand that the Mayor Mr. T. R. Basteed had a resolution passed with reference to the matters which along with others will be forwarded to the Minister of Public Works. This action will no doubt be indorsed by the County Council at their next session.

Now, let your Board of Trade take the matter up, let us be in earnest and again, let us work together, if we do this a bridge is assured. It will be a great help to the town, you will get more trade from the County of Bonaventure, we will not then have to go to the ferry and lose time to get to market. We have to do now, and if your storekeepers do not want too much profit, I have not a doubt but that they will get the greater part of the money that now goes to Eaton's and elsewhere.
