The general conference has just closed at Nashville, and the policy of the denominations on several questions was then settled for at least four years to come. It refused to change the discipline so as to make women eligible as Sunday school superintendents. It petitioned congress against the carrying of mails on Sunday. It declined to amend the general rule forbidding the use of intoxicating beverages, so as to make it also prohibit their manufacture and sale; but it inveighed

against intemperance, and proved that dealers in alcoholic drinks might be proceeded against under the law of the church relating to imprudent conduct. As to the marriage of persons divorced for other causes than adultery, the vote was unanimous that no preacher ought to officiate in such cases; but it was decided not to put any provision in the discipline on the subject. In the matter of amusements, a strenuous effort was made to put all dancing, theatricals, circuses, and card playing under a ban; but it failed, and the law, which leaves such diversions to be dealt with by the local churches, was left unaltered. In dulging in tobacco was not forbidden, but a resolution was passed deprecating an in-temperate use of the weed. The use of the revised New Testament in Sunday schools was ordered to be discontinued. A proposition to assess all members equally for the support of the church, and expel those who refused to pay when able to do so, was rejected. The denomination was asked to celebrate the centennial of Episcopal Methodism, in 1884, by contributing \$2,000,000 to be spirited.
