NEPHEW OPPOSES UNCLE IN N. S.

One Running as Farmer, the
Other as Liberal

SITUATION IN ANTIGONISH

Mr. Crerar Dilates on the Beauties of Free Trade

ANTIGONISH, N. S., Oct. 28.—(By Canadian Press Staff Correspondent)—The entry of Hon. T. A. Crerar into the Nova Scotia political field took place to-day at Antigonish in the constituency of Antigonish-Guysboro, formerly represented in the House by J. A. Sinclair, who has retired from the whirl of politics. Antigonish-Guysboro will have a three-cornered fight. Walter McNeil is Conservative candidate; C. F. McIsaac is running as a Liberal, and D. A. McIsaac, a nephew of the Liberal candidate, is out as a Farmer candidate.

Mr. Crerar dealt more particularly to-day with some aspects of the economic issue as touching on Nova Scotia. Had protection made Canada prosperous, he asked. "Your young men and women in Nova Scotia," he said, "have gone to the United States because they did not have the opportunity here they should have had. Fifty years ago this was a prosperous country. If there is any part of this Dominion which has suffered from the application of protection it is the Province of Nova Scotia. Your geographical position is such that you should prosper from the development of maritime trade, as Great Britain has prospered. You have the facilities to enable you to produce foodstuffs. The population of the New England States is growing and your trade with them should have been developed."

"They need foodstuffs and who is better able to supply them than the Maritime Provinces? But our policy has been directed in another direction, with the result that you have a population which is growing very slowly, indeed."

D. A. McIsaac, the Progressive candidate, made a plea for representation of the "common people" in Parliament. To-morrow Mr. Crerar will speak in Sydney.

BIG CUT IN FREIGHT AFFECTS SUGAR BEETS

Reduction Applies to Carloads Shipped to Wallaceburg.

OTTAWA, Oct. 28.—A general reduction of from one cent to six and a half cents per 100 pounds on the railway freight charges on sugar beets will become effective on November 1, according to a judgment issued this morning by the Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners in the application of the Dominion Sugar Company, Wallaceburg, Ont., for a reduction in the rates charged by the railway companies on carload lots of sugar beets to Wallaceburg. This judgment effects Pere Marquette Railway, Michigan Central, Grand Trunk Railway, Canadian Pacific Railway and the C. W. and L. T. Railway.

The new schedule is worked out on a mileage basis, with an ascending tariff chargeable for each 100 pounds according to distance hauled.

A Rude Awakening

LEAVES ESTATE FOR HOSPITAL

Will of Late Ex-Mayor Smith, of
Tillsonburg, Filed

FINE BEQUEST TO TOWN

Structure to Be Known as "Soldiers' Memorial Hospital"

TILLSONBURG, Oct. 28.—(Special to The Free Press)—By the will of the late ex-Mayor John Smith, who died last week, the greater part of his estate, amounting to several thousand dollars, is left to provide a public hospital here, to be called "The Soldiers' Memorial Hospital."

The will also stipulates that the residue of his estate be invested and the proceeds derived to be used for repaying and maintaining said hospital under a properly authorized hospital board. The document concludes by saying that "I direct that in the carrying on of the said hospital reference shall be given to such patients that are poor and unable to pay for their own treatment, and that sufficient accommodation shall so far as possible be kept for that purpose in connection with said hospital, to be paid for out of said funds."

Mr. Smith was born in Walton, England, on November 16, 1846, and came to Canada in 1868, finally locating in Tillsonburg in 1870, where he made his home until his death. As a contractor he built many of the important buildings of the town, including the city hall, the high school and St. John's Church.

68 YEARS IN LORDS

Earl of Dufferin, Dead, in 94th Year; Lived Under Five Sovereigns.

FALFIELD, Eng., Oct. 28.—Henry John Dufferin, third Earl of Dufferin, died here to-day.

He was born in 1827 and was known as the "Father of the House of Lords," having been a member of that body for 68 years. The earl lived through five reigns.

The heir to the earldom is Berkeley Russell Dufferin, colonial secretary and minister of public instruction at Queensland, from 1885 to 1888. He is the fourth son of the third earl, and was born in 1846.

British Ratepayers Are Aroused
by the High Taxes

VOTING NEXT TUESDAY

Middle Classes' Union Putting
Forth Many Candidates

LONDON, Oct. 28.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—The municipal elections throughout the United Kingdom, except in London, will take place next Tuesday. The apathy of the average English elector concerning local government used to be truly amazing, but with the local taxes imposed by many boroughs now aggregating more than 20 shillings in the pound there has been something of a general awakening.

Municipal anti-waste candidates, as such, are comparatively few this year, simply because every candidate, barring the extreme Laborites, makes emphatic protest against waste.

Ex-service candidates are again in evidence, but the peculiar grievances of this class have not hitherto appealed especially to the average municipal elector as such.

The middle classes' union is putting forth many nominees. The union's president, Baron George Ranken, asks, with a noted conciliator in industrial disputes, asserts that 98 per cent. of its 300 candidates were returned in the municipal elections last year.

BESSARABIANS REVOLT AGAINST ROMANIA

RIGA, Oct. 28.—A wireless message from Moscow announces a growing revolt against the Rumanian Government in Bessarabia.

At the station of Romanovskiy, it says, a sanguinary encounter took place recently between Bessarabian insurgents and Rumanian infantry and cavalry, culminating in the blowing up by the insurgents of an important railway bridge near Chernovitz, in Bukovina.

This resulted in a train wreck, in which, according to the dispatch, many Rumanian soldiers were killed.

MEMORIAL SERVICE TO LATE LADY BECK TO BE SIMPLE, BEAUTIFUL

TORONTO, Oct. 28.—The memorial service for the late Lady Beck, to be held in St. James' Cathedral at 4 o'clock on Sunday afternoon, will be simple and beautiful. Under the present arrangements the service will be conducted by Canon Plummer alone, although there will probably be another clergyman present to pay honor to the memory of Lady Beck.

At to-day's meeting of the Toronto branch of the Red Cross the service was announced and there will be a number of the members of this association in attendance, as Lady Beck was the first vice-president of the provincial branch.

The music will be given by a full choir, which will sing "Unto the Hills Around," "Now the Laborer's Task is O'er," "Abide With Me," "I Heard a Voice From Heaven," "I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say," and the 103rd Psalm.

STORE OF IRISH ARMS AT CARDIFF

Organized System to Procure
War Supplies Revealed

EVIDENCE GIVEN AT TRIAL

Police Barracks in County Waterford, Ireland, Burned

LONDON, Oct. 28.—(Associated Press Cable.)—Startling evidence of a highly-organized system of procuring arms and ammunition was given at Cardiff to-day, when Joseph Connolly, organizer of South Wales branches of the Irish Self-Determination League, was charged with unlawfully hoarding revolvers and explosives.

The chief detective-inspector gave evidence that when he entered the prisoner's lodgings he found revolvers and ammunition and a large quantity of high explosives. He also found a number of highly-important documents, including a list of goods to be procured, including revolvers, machine guns and ammunition. There was also a list of ports at which, presumably, shipping could be obtained and plans of powder magazines in the vicinity of Cardiff, along with receipts signed by two men named Evans, who have been committed for trial on a charge of breaking into a powder magazine in the town.

BARRACKS BURNED.

BELFAST, Oct. 28.—(Associated Press Cable.)—Police barracks at Passage, County Waterford, vacated Wednesday, were burned this morning by a number of men who invaded the village. They warned the villagers in the vicinity of the barracks to seek safety and then sprinkled petrol about and set fire to the barracks. The men threatened penalties for anyone who gave information concerning the affair.

CHARGED AS AN INCENDIARY.
MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—Morris Shapiro, of the firm of Shapiro & Co., with premises at 35 Victoria square, has been arrested, charged with deliberately setting fire on July 11 to the block in which his offices are situated. He appeared before Judge Cusson to-day, who liberated him on \$5,000 bail.

DISARM PARLEY TO OPEN ON 12TH

One Day Later Than Planned by
United States President

PROGRAM IS OUTLINED

Mr. Harding to Personally Welcome the Delegates

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(Associated Press Dispatch.)—Definite decision to hold the first session of the conference on limitations of armaments on the morning of Saturday, November 12, instead of Armistice Day, November 11, was announced to-day at the state department. It was found impossible to reconcile even an informal gathering of the conference on Armistice Day with the program of ceremonies connected with the burial of the United States "unknown soldier."

The conference will be called to order by Secretary of State Hughes and the welcoming address to the delegates by President Harding will follow. It is expected that the conference will then perfect its organization and adjourn to take up its real deliberations. The appointment of committees to consider special topics, arrangements for the distribution of the open sessions of the conference and the discussion of Far Eastern and Pacific problems may be present, and similar matters, will be deferred until the following Monday.

PREPARING HALL.

Progress is being made in the preparation of the auditorium in the building of the Daughters of the American Revolution adjoining the Pan-American building, where the open sessions of the conference will be held. The delegates will sit at a horseshoe-shaped, or rectangular, table during the sessions, with the interpreters and other aides in the open space inside the tables, and the delegates themselves facing each other around the other side of the conference table.

The general public probably cannot be represented at the sessions except by representatives of the press and members of Congress who will be given seats provided for the use of the various embassies and legations in Washington. The seating capacity of the hall will not admit of any wide distribution of seats, as the total number available for all purposes will be less than 1,200.

STAGGERS INTO HOSPITAL WITH INJURED HEAD

WINDSOR, Oct. 28.—William Wikle, an employee of the M. C. R., who lives on Wellington avenue, staggered into Hotel Dieu at 4 o'clock this morning with what appeared to be a fractured skull. He was too weak to give much information about his injury, but the physician who attended him learned that Wikle had an argument somewhere along the M. C. R. tracks with another man and came from the fray with an injured head.

FOUR BANDITS ROB AGED OHIO MAN OF \$29,000

DELTA, Ohio, Oct. 28.—Four unmasked bandits with faces smeared with grease, invaded the office of S. B. Finney, aged 76, a root and herb doctor, late this afternoon and robbed him of \$29,000, after striking him on the head with a revolver and binding him to a chair.

They escaped towards Toledo in an auto. Finney, it is said, had an abhorrence for banks, and kept his savings in a pocket book, which he always carried. His condition is not considered serious.

EXAMINING BODY OF RICH RECLUSE

Remains of E. F. Searles Examined at Methuen, Mass.

RESULT OF POISON RUMOR

Some of Organs Sent to Boston for Analysis

METHUEN, Mass., Oct. 28.—(Canadian Press Dispatch.)—After an autopsy on the body of Edward F. Searles, millionaire recluse, who died at his estate here in August, 1920, some of the organs were sent late to-day to Dr. F. Boos, of Boston, for chemical analysis.

Dr. G. B. Magrath, of Boston, one of the Suffolk County medical examiners, performed the autopsy, assisted by Medical Examiner George W. Dow, of Lawrence. They declined to make any statement pending the analysis of the organs, which they said might require a week or more.

The autopsy was ordered by District Attorney Denny, after he had received anonymous communications suggesting that poison might have caused Searles' death.

After the case had been opened witnesses present withdrew and only an undertaker and Dr. Magrath's stenographer were present at the autopsy, which occupied four hours. The body, except for the organs removed, was returned to the casket and crypt.

APPEALS FOR THE LOWER PAID MEN

A. R. Mosher Says to Cut Their
Wages Is Unfair

OTTAWA, Oct. 28.—(Canadian Press Dispatch.)—The submission of evidence and data to the Canadian National Arbitration Board came to an end here this afternoon, and the board will sit privately to consider its award next week. The evidence put in by A. R. Mosher, for the employees and F. P. Brady, for the Canadian National Railways, in support of their arguments against and for the reduction in wages, was summed up by the chiefs of the two parties before the board.

Mr. Mosher, while admitting that some reductions might be justified at the present time, held that the schedule put into effect by the company was unfair to the lower paid classes of employees. Mr. Brady argued that the company must have the full amount of the reductions.

A flurry came in the proceedings just before the close of the sitting, when Robert Dykes, a representative of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, told the chairman that there were many ways in which the company could economize on operation costs without taking it all from the employees. There had been many appointments, he said, since the Government had taken over the railways. There were more officials now than before the amalgamation, and he believed there could be a saving.

Mr. Brady declared that the criticism was unfair and unreasonable, and that no railway in Canada was so undermanned as was the Canadian National system. What officers had been appointed were necessary for the operation of the road and for seeing that equipment, etc., was kept clean and sanitary.

C. O. C. NOMINATIONS FOR DIRECTORATES

Name 14 Men and Ballots Sent Out for
the Election of Seven.

At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, held last night, primary nominations for directors took place and 14 men were named. Ballots will be sent out next week, with seven to be elected. The ballots will be counted on Thursday.
