At a General Meeting of the Board of Health held at the Court House in Saint Andrews.

Whereas it being considered by this Board as highly necessary and expedient that the Committees of the several Parishes and districts within this county should from time to time with all possible despatch cause to be removed every thing which may be the said Committees be considered offensive, noxious or likely to cause the spreading of any diseases or distempers, or injure the public health.
