Bibles printed in America. It seems evident that the Dickinson's Testament has been printed from plates, and there is reason to believe that the plates in question were those taken to Toronto by Eastwood, in 1839 or 1840, according to O'Callaghan. There may be an error in the date given by O'Callaghan, and it is not impossible that Eastwood had sold his plates to William Lyon Mackenzie, the editor of the Dickinson's Testament.

The questions we now have to elucidate are:

Who was William Lyon Mackenzie, whose name is at the foot of the Dickinson's Testament title page? Was he really a printer by trade? In what years did he exercise his profession? Can we find in the Upper Canada newspapers of 1837 some note or item which would lead us to believe that the book in question has really been printed at Toronto, and has not been brought over in sheets from the United States, and the title page of the American edition substituted for the one quoted above?

We hope that in the next issue of Le Courrier du Livre, some of our readers will have something new in this matter.
