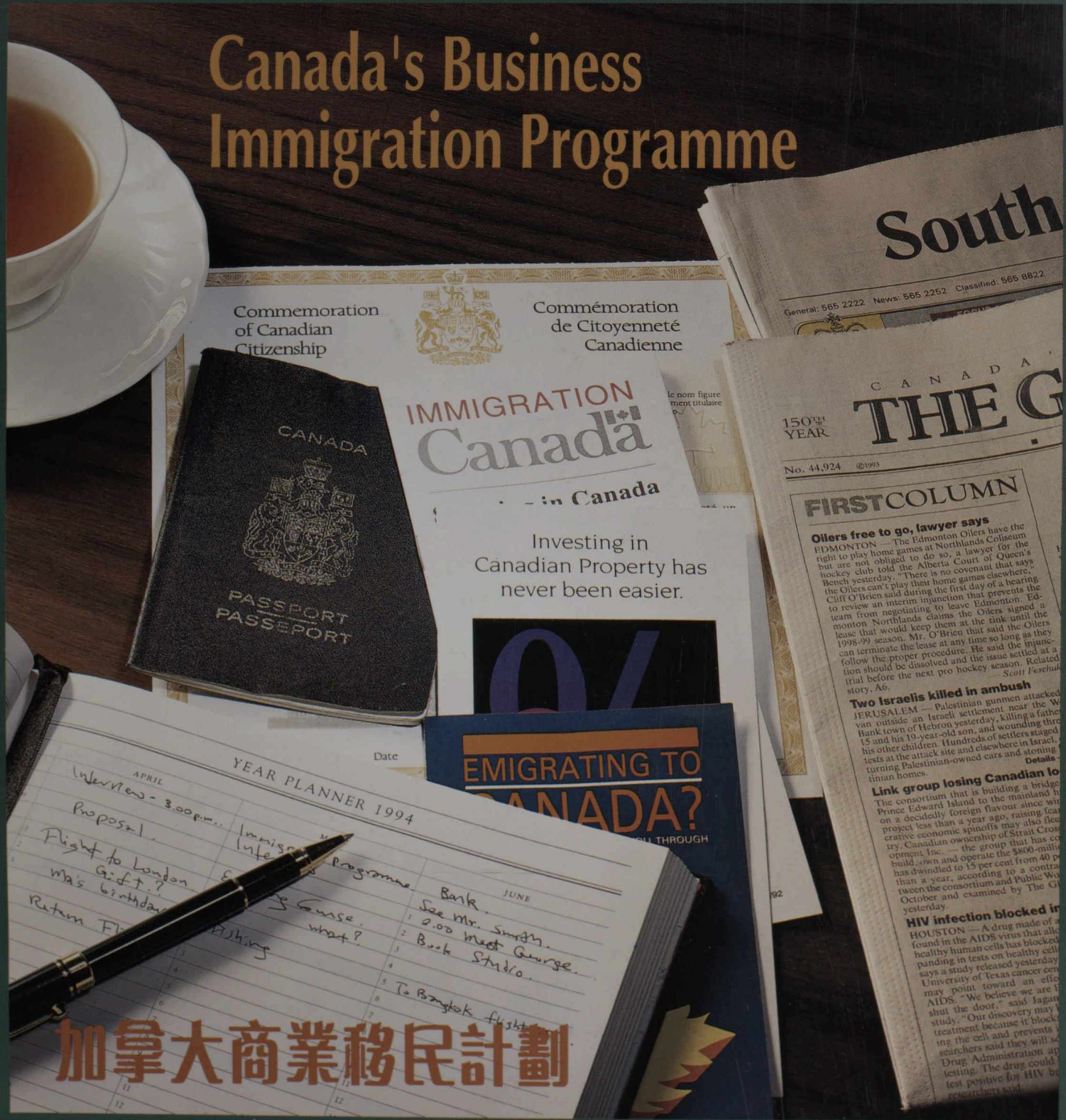

**Oilers free to go, lawyer says**  
EDMONTON — The Edmonton Oilers have the right to play home games at Northlands Coliseum but are not obliged to do so, a lawyer for the club told the Alberta Court of Queen's Bench yesterday. "There is no covenant that says the Oilers can't play their home games elsewhere," Cliff O'Brien said during the first day of a hearing to review an interim injunction that prevents the Edmonton Oilers from negotiating to leave Edmonton. Edmonton Northlands claims the Oilers signed a lease that would keep them at the rink until the 1998-99 season. Mr. O'Brien said that the Oilers can terminate the lease at any time so long as they follow the proper procedure. He said the injunction should be dissolved and the issue settled at a trial before the next pro hockey season. Related story, A6. — Scott Forehand

**Link group losing Canadian lo**  
The consortium that is building a bridge between Prince Edward Island and the mainland is on a decidedly foreign flavour since it was projected less than a year ago, raising fears of creative economic spinoffs may also flow from Canadian ownership of Strait Crossing. The group that has co-ordinated the project has a \$400-million build, own and operate the bridge for 25 years, according to a contract between the consortium and Public Works Canada, signed in October and examined by The Globe yesterday.

**HIV infection blocked in**  
HOUSTON — A drug made of a found in the AIDS virus that blocked healthy human cells has blocked HIV from spreading in tests on healthy cells, says a study released yesterday by the University of Texas cancer center. "We believe we are locking the door," said Jagannathan. "Our discovery may be a treatment because it blocks HIV from entering the cell and prevents it from spreading," researchers said. They will seek approval from the Drug Administration for testing. The drug could be used to test positive for HIV by researchers said.
