Mr. STEWART (Leeds): With respect to work which has not been completed or even undertaken, I scarcely think that recommendations and reports such as those mentioned in this motion should at this stage be produced. I believe it is not in the public interest to supply this information.

Mr. POULIOT: Mr. Speaker, I rise to a point of order. When the item was passed by the house I could have asked my hon. friend to read the whole report of the engineer. I was good enough not to insist upon my hon. friend reading that report when the estimates were considered. We are always permitted to see office records. I do not ask that my hon. friend should go to any particular trouble. On the contrary he has been reimbursed the moneys that were unwisely spent in my county, and I congratulate him on his move in that respect.

Mr. SPEAKER: The motion is not debatable. Mr. Pouliot moves, seconded by Mr. Casgrain that an order of the house do issue for a copy of reports of the district engineer to the chief engineer, and for the latter's reports to the Deputy Minister of Public Works, particularizing the vote of 1931-32 for repairs to the wharf of Rivière du Loup. Is it the pleasure of the house to adopt the motion?

Motion negatived.
