4. If municipalities have a government annuity plan, are they compelled to pay into the Canada pension plan?

5. Is legislation anticipated to provide for the repayment of these frozen assets to those municipalities now entered in other plans?

2. 201 plans have been suspended or discontinued and it is believed that these have been replaced by OMER.

3. No information, but it is possible in respect of the 22 government annuity plans which are still active.

4. Yes.

5. No, because the annuity pension credits remain in force for the individual employees concerned.

Mr. L. M. Brand (Saskatoon): Mr. Speaker, I would just like to bring to your attention the fact that I have had questions Nos. 2,532 and 2,606 on the order paper since January 26 and February 10 respectively. They are both simple and straightforward questions, and I see no reason why they could not have been answered by the government within a reasonable time.

FLOOD PROTECTION ON FRASER RIVER
