sovereign. If Parliament wants to change a decision made previously or a decision of another Parliament, so long as the matter is within the federal jurisdiction under our constitution, Parliament has the right to do so. What the government is proposing at this time is that this House take the decision to change this surtax by extending the period for one year. If this House takes that decision, I do not think it can be suggested it is going back on anything that happened in the past or on anything that has occurred in light of circumstances in the meantime.

Mr. Winch: I accept the explanation of the hon. minister, but I despise dishonesty on the part of the Government.

Mr. Henry Latulippe (Compton): Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask the minister why the government is maintaining this tax. We are told that for 1970 the government is expecting a huge surplus.

If the budget of the government is satisfactorily balanced, why should it unbalance the budgets of all Canadians to the benefit of the federal government's?

Mr. Gray: Mr. Speaker, the Minister of Finance (Mr. Benson) said, in his budget speech, that it was necessary, in order to win the battle against inflation, to maintain fiscal restraints. In this regard, one of the methods he advocated was to maintain the surtax for one year in order to win this battle against inflation, which is in the interest of all Canadians, including the lower income groups.

Mr. Aiken: I have one further question. A moment ago the minister declined to go into the past record regarding surtaxes. Can he assure the house that in looking to the future it is the intention of the Government to drop this tax when the temporary period of one year expires?

Mr. Gray: Mr. Speaker, the government is proposing at this time that the surtax be extended for a further year. If I answered the question I think I would be departing from the well established principle that has been followed by governments of all parties in Canada of not attempting to make announcements on fiscal changes until the appropriate time comes to do so.
