Hon. H. A. Olson (Minister of Agriculture): 1. Yes, 24 hours a day for five days a week, for in house equipment.

- 2. Yes, excepting Saturdays and Sundays, for in house equipment.
- 3. The number of hours planned for future computer utilization depends on the type of computer operated in house, the number and nature of new applications and on utilization of outside computers and service bureaux.
