Agri-bond Program

That the motion be amended by deleting references to the Agriculture Committee and substituting a reference to the Standing Committee on Finance, Trade and Economic Affairs, and by deleting the date of March 31, 1984, and substituting the date of June 25, 1984.

If the House is in agreement, perhaps we can pass unanimously the motion that this matter be sent to the Finance Committee, and everybody can get to work on it.

Motion (Mr. Gurbin), as amended, agreed to.

Mr. Evans: Mr. Speaker, I should like to rise at this moment to inform the House that we have just been informed from Stockholm that the Right Hon. Prime Minister of Canada (Mr. Trudeau) has been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize.

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Forrestall: Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of order. I think you will find that there is agreement on this side of the House to take your counsel and advice and perhaps, by seeking unanimous consent, to relieve ourselves of the motion put earlier in the hour with respect to the extension of hours, so that we might now call it six o'clock and the adjournment motion could then be properly put.

The Acting Speaker (Mr. Herbert): I could make it very easy for the Hon. Member. Since it is after six o'clock, the "Late Show" would lapse automatically. At this point I will adjourn the House until tomorrow at two o'clock p.m.
