23. Even if we were to accept the minister's argument, which I totally refute anyhow, it does not even make sense using his own criteria.

Notwithstanding any of that, this bill, if it has not passed both Houses of Parliament and been proclaimed, is not yet an act. If it is not act of Parliament, no one has any right to pretend that it is. You, Mr. Speaker, have indicated that to all of us before.

I am sorry to say that this government has not understood in the past the very worthwhile advice that Mr. Speaker gave. Not only that, the government still fails to do that even today.

Mr. Speaker: I have looked carefully at the document complained of. I have listened to the argument. I will consider the matter and report back to the House very quickly.

Mr. Peter Milliken (Kingston and the Islands): Mr. Speaker, I have the honour to present a petition signed by numerous residents of various cities in British Columbia who are opposed to the goods and services tax.

This petition was sent to the right hon. member for Vancouver Quadra. I am pleased to table it on his behalf and on behalf of the numerous Canadians who have signed it.

They indicate that having had the present manufacturers' sales tax increased from 9 per cent to 13.5 per cent under the Draconian tax policies of this government, they feel it is unfair that Canadians be saddled with the

additional burden of a tax on services, as proposed in the goods and services tax. They call upon Parliament to reject this unfair and discriminatory tax.
