tual regulations of police within the cities of Quebee and Montreal, and town of Three-Rivers; also for extending regulations of police to other Towns and Villages in certain eases, and for repealing certain acts or ordinances therein mentioned." And whick act was continued by a subsequent act passed in the forty-seventh year of his Majesty's reign and is now in force.

ART. 1—A former Grand Jury having presented as a nuisance, interments, within the city, the same for some time past have been discontinued, and the Magistrates, being deeply impressed with a sense of the salutary effects which such discontinuance is calculated to produce, are determined to enforce the same, and accordingly do strictly prohibit the interment of every corps within any part the city, (those of Ecclesiastics and Nuns only excepted,) under the penalty of five pounds for each offence, upon each and every person who shall assist at, or perform any such interment not so excepted.

ART. 2—Every person intending to build on any square, street or lane in the city or suburbs of Montreal, shall apply to the sitting Justices, who shall cause a line to be drawn, under their direction, by the Surveyor of the highways, streets and lanes, for the builder's direction, conformable to the line of the square, street or lane; of which operation the said Surveyor shall draw up a munute in writing to remain of record in his office, and a copy thereof shall be delivered to the proprietor or person demanding such line. The said Surveyor shall have a right to demand and receive the sum of seven shillings and six pencefor each line, not exceeding forty feet, including the copy of the minute, and if the line exceeds forty feet, jes
