THAT large quantities of nickel in the shape of nickel ore and nickel matte are being exported from this Dominion to the United States of America for the purpose of being smelted, refined, sold and distributed in that country. Said nickel, after being so imported, ceases to be under the control of the Dominion or Imperial Governments and is liable to pass into the possession of the enemy;

AND WHEREAS the nations now waging war against His Majesty cannot long continue the conflict unless they obtain fresh supplies of nickel, and such supplies are only available from neutral countries to which Canadian nickel is exported;

THEREFORE, we hereby humbly petition your honorable body to enact without delay legislation prohibiting the export of all nickel, nickel ore, nickel matte, ferro-nickel, nickel oxide or any combination or alloy of nickel during the continuance of the present war.
