

*sons' Bay Co.*, was later to dispute their sway. Thence they despatch curious and interesting journals and letters, wherein trade, Indian customs, clashes with their rivals, and topics of their every day life, are lengthly dwelt upon. Most of these manuscripts were addressed to Roderick McKenzie, foremost among the "bourgeois;" others were copied and revised by him for publication about 1840, but seem to have been published for the first time by the late Hon. L. R. Masson, who married his grand-daughter.
