It is proposed, in view of the practice heretofore observed by the com pany in separating in the annual re port the revenue from land sales from other income, to adopt the same policy with reference to interest and vestments, dividends, rentals and other sources of income other than from railway and steamship operations, incorporating the income from these items in one fund, from which the directors will make such periodical distribution as may be warranted by lar dividends that may be declared on common stock of the company. It is estimated that interest and dividend return from these sources will be about \$4,500,000 during the cur-

LONDON, April 3 .- The extraordinarily high tide along the Suffolk coast to-day washed up hundreds of gold, silver and bronze coins of early Saxon times in the neighborhood of Aldeburgh. Large quantities of antique bronze rings and ornaments, supposed to be relics of the submerged City of Dunwich, also were cast up by the sea.
