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WORKMEN FROM AUSTRALIA COME TO REBUILD FRISCO

Vivid Description of Present Day Scenes in Stricken City From Byron E. Walker.

After a six-weeks' tour of the Canadian west, with a side trip down to San Francisco, Byron E. Walker, general manager of the Bank of Commerce, has returned home greatly impressed, particularly with the wealth of British Columbia.

"A wonderful province, literally an empire, and with a population nearly that of the City of Toronto. It is one of the richest places on earth, but— the one fly in the ointment—"the physical difficulties to be overcome are enormous."

Referring to the hostile comment which his address, while at the coast, on the necessity of importing cheap unskilled labor, has received, Mr. Walker said he was not personally antagonistic to labor, and the truth of what he said was realized by every intelligent person in the province.

"The fact which is not realized," said Mr. Walker, "is the benefit to skilled labor which would result from the development of British Columbia were unskilled labor available to develop these resources. If this initial development were made possible, there would be a consequent prosperity in which all classes of skilled labor would assuredly share. In opposing the importation of labor, skilled laborers are adversely affecting their future best interests."

Of his visit to the stricken city of the Golden Gate, Mr. Walker said: "It is always more or less useless to bemoan the past, and while the people of San Francisco were certainly stunned for a moment by the unexampled nature of the calamity, it is safe to say that almost all of the silly talk about permanent ruin was indulged in outside of that city. The clearing of the debris for such new buildings as are being built is difficult beyond all ordinary experience after great fires. The streets are crowded with the many hundreds of teams which have been for six months, and which must for a year or more to come, be used in carrying away the debris. Blasting for the destruction of unsafe walls, is heard in every direction, but many buildings stand with almost complete walls, which must come down by the slow process of picking loose brick after brick, and of cutting the rivets of steel girders. I heard of one building, the removal of which cost \$30,000, and others yet to be taken down the cost of destroying which is estimated at \$50,000, and even larger figures.

Cheaper Under Difficulties. "Another six months will make a great difference, but in the meantime the confusion in the streets is indescribable; the dust lies inches deep, and every wind makes the conditions of life, indoors and out, what any other people but the much-tried but supremely good-natured San Franciscans would call intolerable.

"Although much was swept away much remains. What was swept away was largely the implements for doing business. The business itself remains. This is a fact not, I think, quite appreciated in the east. The bank clearings are larger than they were a year ago. This is a startling statement, and if they had only one-half as large as a year ago most of us would have felt that they were doing well under the unparalleled circumstances. The army of workmen have to be fed and clothed, and there are many kinds of transactions, such as stock speculation, real estate transfers, etc., which have fallen off, and these shrink the total of the bank clearings. The figures as they stand are absolute proof that the ordinary trade of San Francisco is going on pretty much the same as before the disaster.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

ALD. STEWART HAS EVIDENCE TO GET LOWER RATES

City Council Will Resort to Arbitration—Suit Against Street Railway Ordered.

Hamilton, Oct. 29.—(Special.)—This evening the city council authorized the board of works to incur expenditure in procuring evidence for the arbitration over a reduction in the street lighting rate. Ald. Witton and others thought the board should not proceed with the arbitration unless the council authorized it to do so after seeing the evidence. Ald. Stewart said he had every hope of winning and he did not intend to show his evidence to have spread broadcast by the aldermen, and the council authorized him to go ahead.

Ald. MacLeod gave a notice of motion to appoint H. L. Barr chief clerk in the city clerk's office. Ald. Witton protested that the motion should have come from the finance committee, and said that he would not stand for any other procedure. Ald. MacLeod then withdrew the notice.

Amendments to the dog bylaw were passed providing for the destruction of vagrant and troublesome dogs.

On motion of Ald. Stewart the city solicitor was instructed to proceed against the street railway for the over-crowded condition of its cars during the evening, and the street railway was requested to lay double tracks on Aberdeen-avenue west of Queen-street and single track on Locke-street from Herkimer-street to Aberdeen-avenue.

Ear Slapping Adverted. Slapping naughty boys' ears was the method of keeping them straight in Sunday schools advocated by Rev. E. J. Etherington at the annual meeting of the Boys' Home on Simpson-street today. The institution had a prosperous year, the smallest number of boys in the history of the home, 45, now being carried. The receipts for the year amounted to \$4289, and there was a balance on hand of \$358.

The inquiry on the death of Harry G. R. Peardon, who was fatally injured at Copetown, was opened this evening, but was adjourned until Tuesday night.

It is said that Thomas Merritt, an ex-policeman, who was sentenced to five years for breaking into Frank W. J. Peardon's house, after serving two years of the sentence.

City Engineer Barrow returned to the city this evening with his young wife. He says that he has no thought of resigning and is busily engaged in framing an estimate for the city.

The clerks in the Hamilton postoffice have joined the movement to call upon the government for better pay. In the future, they will be paid the same as the clerks in the other cities.

The city's case against the street railway will be heard here by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board this week. Col. J. M. Gibson and W. C. Hawkins will put into the box by the city to explain the book-keeping of the firm.

The Ethel M. School of New York attracted Dr. Seath's attention, but he could not accede to the belief that ethical and manual culture was possible apart from Christianity.

A. Kelly Evans and Oliver Adams Organize Branch of Association.

Campbellford, Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Campbellford falls in line with a branch of the Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association, which was formed to-night.

A large number of citizens of all classes were roused to enthusiasm by the addresses of A. Kelly Evans and Oliver Adams, the secretary and president, respectively, of the headquarters branch, Toronto.

Mr. Kelly explained the objects and duties of the association, and showed how Campbellford could be benefited by forming a branch and helping in the work. Mr. Evans cited the past and present condition of the State of Maine, and showed from statistics the immense sums of money possible to attract by reasonable protection being afforded fish and game.
