Called Out by Spain for War With the United States-The Orders Were Secret. New York, April 8.-A special to The

New York, April 8.—A special to The World from Hayana says: Spain is calling out every fighting man in Cuba for war with the United States. The order for the long-expected military draft has been issued by Captain-General Bianco, after a council of war at the Palace with the generals. A copy of the order has been sent to every town in Cuba.

It commands every male Spanish subject between the ages of 10 and 40 to register for immediate military duty at the office of the commandante of the district. The place of registration in Hayana is the military palace, the residence of General Parrado and Dr. Congosto.

The utmost serrecy has been maintained in everything connected with the order. It is not mentioned in the gazette, the official receptacle of everything that emanates from the palace. But officials there admit its existence and consider it a sort of finishing touch to war preparations. A man at the palace who is very close to the Captain-General, said to a New York World correspondent: "This order will not be much of a surprise to the inhabitants of the island. It has been talked of for a long correspondent: This order will not be much of a surprise to the inhabitants of the island. It has been talked of for a long time. The only wonder is that it was not issued long ago.

"No; the men who register will not be assigned to military duty at once. They will be given instructions in the manual of arms for an hour or so every day, but will be permitted to attend to their regular vocations the rest of the time. Should any emergency arise, however, they will at once be sent to the field or to the defence of some seaport town."

Cuban sympathizers in Havana are jubilant over the military draft. They say it only shows to what straits Spain has been reduced. The great majority of the men who will be compelled to serve under the Spanish fing are Cubans, whose sympathies are with the insurgents. Many of them already have brothers and fathers fighting under Gomez and Garcia. They certainly cannot be very loyal or enthusiastic at the prospects of dying for a country that they have been taught from their earliest childhood to hate.

CONDUCTOR SNIDER'S FUNERAL.

The Remains of the Honored Grand Trunk Evangelist Laid Away -Beautiful Floral Tributes.

Fergus, Ont., April 8.—One of the most representative funerals ever held in this place was that of W. K. Snider, the popular conductor on the Grand Trunk Railway. His death took place at Windsor, and after a funeral service there his remains were brought to Fergus last night. Conductor Snider may well be cafled a self-made man; beginning as a newsboy on the train, ne made his way, up till he was one of the most honored and trusted conductors on the continent. About 10 or 12 years ago he became a decided Christian, and nis evangelistic services were valued and sought after, both in Canada and the United States. His place as master of the platform was acknowledged by all who knew him. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. T. W. Jackson, assisted by Revs. J. G. Scott and S. Sellery, Guelph; Dr. Henderson, Berlin; D. N. Snider, a cousin, of Milton, and Revs. J. B. Mullan, J. H. McVlear and M. Swann of Fergus, Railroad men and friends from Palmerston, Durham, Hamilton, Toronto, Guelph, Lucknow and London came to pay their last tribute of respect. The pali-beaters were Messrs. Richard Baxter, Burlington; Rébert Snider, Guelph; James Cline and George Cline, both of Wingham, all cousins of the deceased, and A. B. Munson, London, and D. W. Hayes, Lucknow, railroad men. A very arge and respectable body of the Independent Order of Foresters also took part in the services, he being a member of Court Brock, Toronto, which sent a beautiful wreath. The floral tributes were numerous, but one from his brother conductors deserves special mention. It was a beautiful archway of flowers, with gates ajar in the centre and "Our Brother's Last Trip" in the foundation.

He leaves a wife, daughter of Mr. Thos. Milne of this place, and one daughter. Flanncially they are left in comfortable circumstances, and have the sympathy of a large circle of friends.
