"It is said this flour is not contraband," he continued. "This may or may not be true, but it is a question of fact to be determined, whether this flour is for use of an active hostile."

A Crack at Hale.

Mr. Davis thought the read question now under consideration is whether the matter comes within the province of international law. He said it did not become the senation at this time.
