ASSASSINATION OF HUMBERT

HIS CAUSE GREAT SORROW

The Murderer, Angelo Bressi, Worked as a Silk Weaver at Paterson, New Jersey, Until May 7—Says He Had No Accomplices.

News of the King's Death Was Kept Quiet to Give the Cabinet Time to Secure the Safety of the Monarchy—Outrage Was Received With Horror in Great Britain—Queen Victoria Wires Condolences to Humbert's Widow—Cheering for the Young King.

Monza, July 30.—Few additional details of the terrible tragedy are available. It happened so quickly and unexpectedly that the king was dead almost before the spectators realized what had occurred. No special precautions had been taken. Very few police were in attendance and only a small guard of soldiers was keeping the way for the carriage. The king, amid the cheers of the crowd, came out smiling, accompanied by his aide-de-camp, Gen. Ponsio Vaglia. He had entered the carriage and was driving off when the revolver shot was fired in quick succession.

Bressi Was Cheering.

Some witnesses assert that Bressi was seen just previously waving his hands and cheering. The first shot wounded the king in the neck; the second, the fatal one, pierced his heart; and the third broke the arm of the already dying sovereign.

People Were Stunned.

The crowd, stunned by the unexpected news, but speedily a rush was made towards the assassin. He did not attempt to escape and was roughly treated until the carabinieri formed a cordon and secured him from the fury of the people.

King's Last Words.

An eye-witness says that immediately after the shots were fired the king fell back, placing his hand to his heart. He was instantly supported by Gen. Ponsio Vaglia, who told the coachman to drive with all speed to the castle. After his exclamation, "It is nothing," he did not utter a word.

Sorrow of the Nation.

Rome, July 30.—Thousands of telegrams have been received from all parts of the empire indicative of the deep sorrow of the whole nation. Everywhere work was suspended to-day, and the houses and theatres were closed. In the principal cities the municipal authorities are considering plans to honor the memory of the murdered monarch.

Cheering for the Young King.

At Messina a procession marched through the streets cheering for the young king and the young queen. At Palermo an imposing demonstration proceeded in solemn silence to the municipal offices to express the sorrow and indignation of the population. There were similar demonstrations in other towns.

CABLES FROM PEKING JULY 29

Message of the British Minister Was in Cipher and is Accepted on All Sides as Welcome News of the Legations.

Says Since July 16 There Has Been an Armistice—All Women and Children Are in British Legation—Casualties to Date 62 Killed—Number of Wounded in the Hospital—Two Officers of the Legation Killed.

London, July 29.—(4.50 a.m.)—Sir Claude MacDonald's welcome despatch, dated July 27, and received in cipher, is accepted on all sides as dispelling any doubts that might still have existed regarding the genuineness of the despatches. It is an error in transmitting the message failed to show the number of wounded. David Oliphant and Warren were two student interpreters.

New York, July 30.—The Japanese Consul at Tien Tsin sent a runner on July 29 to Peking. On the 10th runner left Peking, bringing a cipher telegram to the Japanese Government, says a Chefoo special to the Herald, dated July 27. It reads:

"We are defending ourselves against the Chinese very well, but now the attack has stopped. We will keep up to the last of the month, although it will be no easy task. The Japanese casualties are: 'Killed—Kojima, diplomatic attaché, captain and one student, and also a few marines. 'Wounded—Five or six; slightly wounded, very many.'"

KING IS A BAD OLD MAN.
