NEW CORPS CALLED CANADIAN YEOMANRY COMMANDER SENATE PO INS NOW IN OTTAWA

Recruiting in Ontario Takes Place on Dec. 9 to | 11, Inclusive-This Province Expected to Raise 169.

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—During the four days, Dec. 9, 10, 11 and 12, a mounted force of nearly 600 men, for service in South Africa, will be recruited at different points thruout the Dominion. The force will be called the "Canadian Yeomanry." The orders for the enlistment of this force were issued from headquarters this evening. Militia Orders.

The orders read: "His Majesty's government, having signified their pleasure to accept the offer of Canada to raise a corps of mounted troops for service in South Africa, a regiment, to be known as the Canadian Yeomanry,' and clothed, armed and equipped as the Imperial Yeomanry of His Majesty's regular army, will be organized, under the command of Colonel T. D. B. Evans, C.B., commanding Canadian Mounted Rifles, as hereunder:

Preference will be given to men who have had previous servic in South Africa, and to be single men. Married men and widowers with children will be accepted, but no separation allowance will be granted them.

Plan Could Not Succeed. If Britain were dependent upon any single country or closely allied group of countries for her food supply, said Prof Shortt, there might, in certain extreme contingencies, be an attempt to cripple her by cutting off her food supply. But, under present conditions, any attempt to starve her by one combination would afford an excellent opportunity for another combination to reap a handsome profit from supplying her with food, at prices somewnat higher than normal.

In the present trouble in South Africa, it was shown that the well-nigh universal hostility of European nations to Great Britain did not extend to the exportation of anything they could sell to Great Britain, even that which would help her in her struggle.

Self-Interest Always First. It would be a very powerful motive indeed, continued the speaker, which would cause any of these nations to undergo great commercial distress for the purpose of distressing or destroying, if possible, their best customer, while the possibility of even half of them combining for this purpose was simply beyond belief.
