NEGLECTED. The fear is gaining ground that in these days of technical knowledge and practical training, the basis of all education is being neglected. The technical schools and colleges of science are year by year turning out thousands of young men whose ambition is to engage in engineering and industrial undertakings of all classes. In order to prepare students to enter upon successful careers in the various departments of engineering. these technical schools have arranged their curricula with reference to teaching the largest amount of science and engineering that can be compressed into the time at the student's disposal. The schools have found it necessary to omit from their courses many studies which were formerly regarded as essential to a liberal education. Chief among these

A knowledge of the modern languages is no doubt necessary to a highly suc cessful career in many departments of science; and, in any event, it is clear that a liberal knowledge of English is absolutely essential to the engineer or scientist who hopes to ever make any great headway in his profession. An engineer may possess ever so much practical knowledge, but what good will it be to him of he cannot write a presentable report or put his ideas into

clear, concise English? The technical journals on the other side of the line have awakened to the seriousness of the situation, and The Electrical Review raises its voice thus:

"The value of an engineering report does not depend so much upon the erudition and the familiarity with the subject exhibited by the engineer making it, as it does upon his ability to make clear and explicit his reasons, to show logically the origin of his deductions. and to impress upon others his conclusions. It is precisely this art which has been neglected. Facility in the use of language is a tool in the hands of a competent man with which he cam accomplish much. Mere knowledge, without this facility, is practically useless."

The lack of instruction in English is no doubt more marked in the United States than it is in Canada, but we require, nevertheless, to pay attention to the warning. It is evident to the observer that in the eager rush after what is called "practical knowledge," the deficiency referred to has been allowed to extend more or less thrught the whole educational system on this continent We have young men leaving school and college cram full of special knowledge. but yet unable to appreciate their mother tongue, or to write a coherent

In the old time Public schools, spelling matches trained the young idea in the mysteries of orthography and the study of "Latin roots" laid the first foundation for an appreciative understanding of our own language. And in the old time grammar schools and colleges the principle followed in the primary schools was carried out in order to give every student first of all a "liberal education."
