CHILDREN'S DAY IN ANGELIC CHURCHES OBSERVED SUNDAY

Splendid Services In All the London Parishes.

"Children's Day" was observed yesterday in the Church of England throughout Canada, when the program for the special exercises of the Sunday school, arranged by the Sunday school commission of the Church of England was followed.

In St. Paul's Cathedral the whole day was set apart for bringing the subject of Sunday school education prominently before the congregation.

In his morning sermon the rector, Rev. Dr. Tucker, emphasized the fact that the building of character is the aim of true education, and that the centre of education is moral and not intellectual only. Religion alone insures a solid foundation, he stated, "and the development of the power to discriminate between right and wrong and choose the right. Only through religious training can awakening take place in regard to responsibility towards God."

Three Essentials. Continuing, Dr. Tucker dwelt upon the three avenues through which religious education is obtained, the home, the school, and the Sunday school. "Modern conditions," he stated, "are such that the religious training in the home requires to be supplemented. Men and women are so busy in this age that they have not the time to devote to the religious education of their children. The schools are largely secular, and this cannot be otherwise owing to unfortunate divisions of thought and creed."

"The Sunday school must supplement and supply the lack in the training of the home and day school."

Plea to Parents. In conclusion, the preacher made a plea to the parents to support in every possible way the work of the Sunday school. Touching upon the work of the Sunday school commission he drew attention to the special training through it given to clergymen and teachers to more thoroughly fit them for the work of training in righteousness, "the nation's greatest asset, the girls and boys."

In the afternoon, Rev. C. W. Foreman preached at the special services of the Sunday school.

Opening Hunting Season

Near and Prospects Good

Forty Moose Seen in Four Days in Abitibi District of Quebec.

The crack of the hunter's rifle will soon be heard once more. The hunting season for deer, moose and caribou opens in the Province of Quebec on September 1, except in the counties of Ottawa, Pontiac, Labelle and Temiskaming, where the open season begins October 1. Sport will be excellent this year, according to reports received at Grand Trunk headquarters, Montreal.

Many sportsmen are planning trips to the new moose country in the Abitibi district of Northern Quebec, reached through Cochrane, the junction of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway and the Transcontinental Line.

In the hunting reserves, there known as "Canucks' Camps," moose are more prevalent this year than ever before. This, it is believed, is due to the natural increase, and to the fact that the moose are steadily moving into this new region from the more southerly areas. One party just returned from this region sighted in four days more than forty moose. Some wonderful moving pictures of moose have just been taken there. In this Abitibi district there is also considerable bear with some deer and a few caribou.

In Ontario the hunting season opens November 1, but an order in council has just been promulgated allowing moose hunting in that portion of Ontario lying north of the Transcontinental Line to begin October 10, and extend to November 30, making the season considerably longer than in former years.

The transportation authorities are co-operating in every way in the work of attracting sportsmen to Canada, and stand ready to give all available information to the intending visitor.

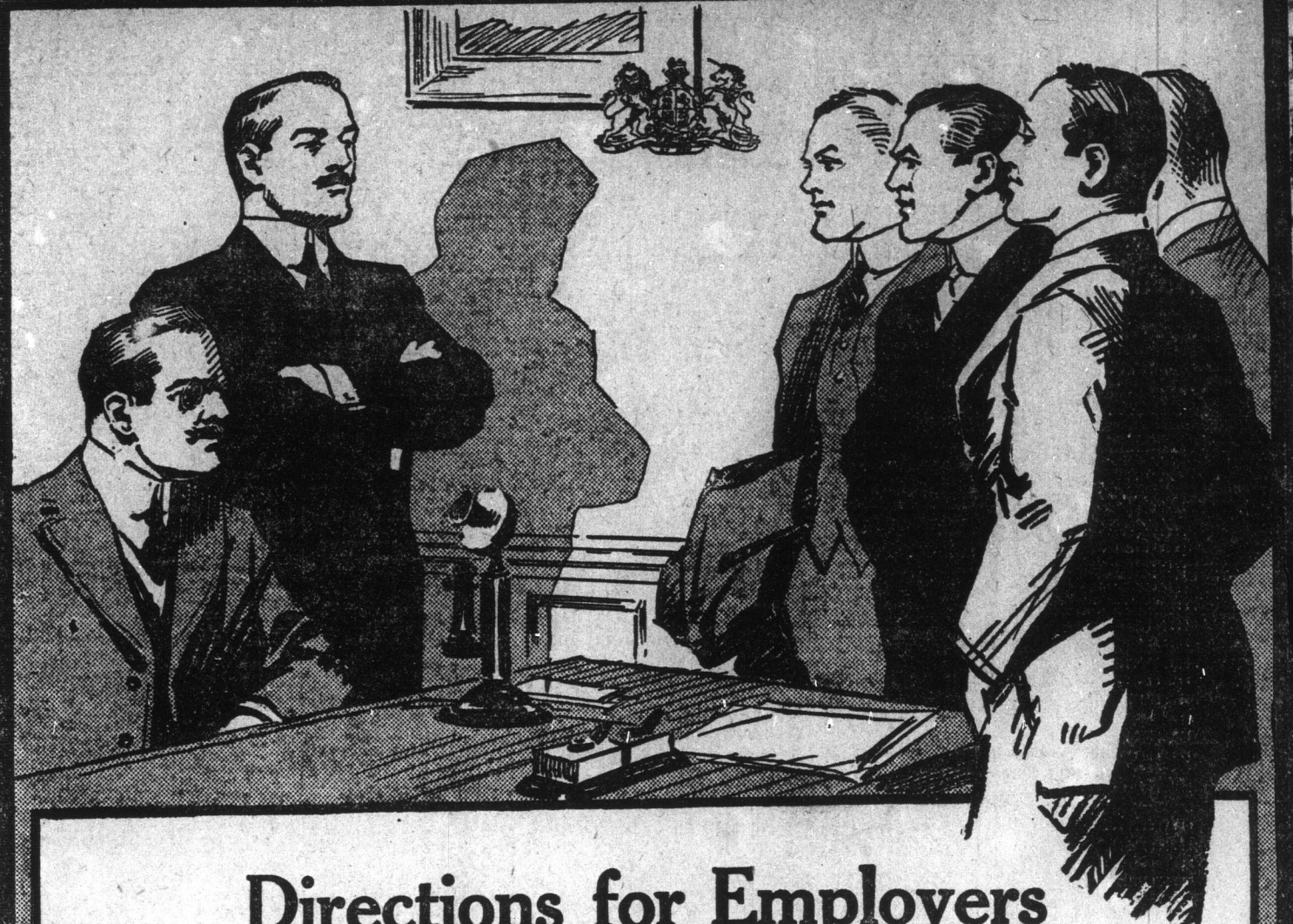

Directions for Employers

Who Purpose Claiming Exemption for Class One Men in Their Employ

THE following course is recommended for employers who have in their employ any number of men—bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before Jan. 1st, 1917, and who propose claiming exemption for any of these men, to continue in work which is deemed to be in the National interest:

First, it will simplify matters for you and for the exemption tribunals if you instruct Class One men in your employ to go up for medical examination at the nearest Medical Board Centre.

Only Class One men, who upon medical examination are placed in Category A are liable for immediate service under the Act. Class One men placed in Categories B, C or E satisfy immediate requirements if they attach their medical report to their claim for exemption.

Employer's Statement and Schedule

Second, prepare a full statement of the total number of your employees grouping them according to their respective occupations and qualifications and stating the number in each group. Indicate the possibility or otherwise of replacing the labour of Class One men with the labour of those unavailable for military service, or outside the statutory class called up; the extent to which the withdrawal of men in the statutory class would affect the business, the reason for considering that the carrying on of the business is in the National interest, and such other facts and circumstances as may appear to be relevant.

Append to this general statement and classification, a schedule of the names, ages and occupations of all men in Class One, indicating as to those who have been medically examined, the medical Category in which they have been placed, noting against each name whether or not you propose to claim exemption on behalf of the man.

Where exemption is claimed employer should state his opinion whether such exemption should be conditional on the man's continuing to follow his present occupation and whether it would suffice if exemption were granted for one, two or more months, as the case may be.

A copy of both statement and schedule should be prepared for each man for whom the employer is applying for exemption.

Forms for Exemption

These forms may be obtained on request from any Post Master, who will transmit the forms when filled in, to the Registrar.

Claims for exemption must be made not later than November 10th.

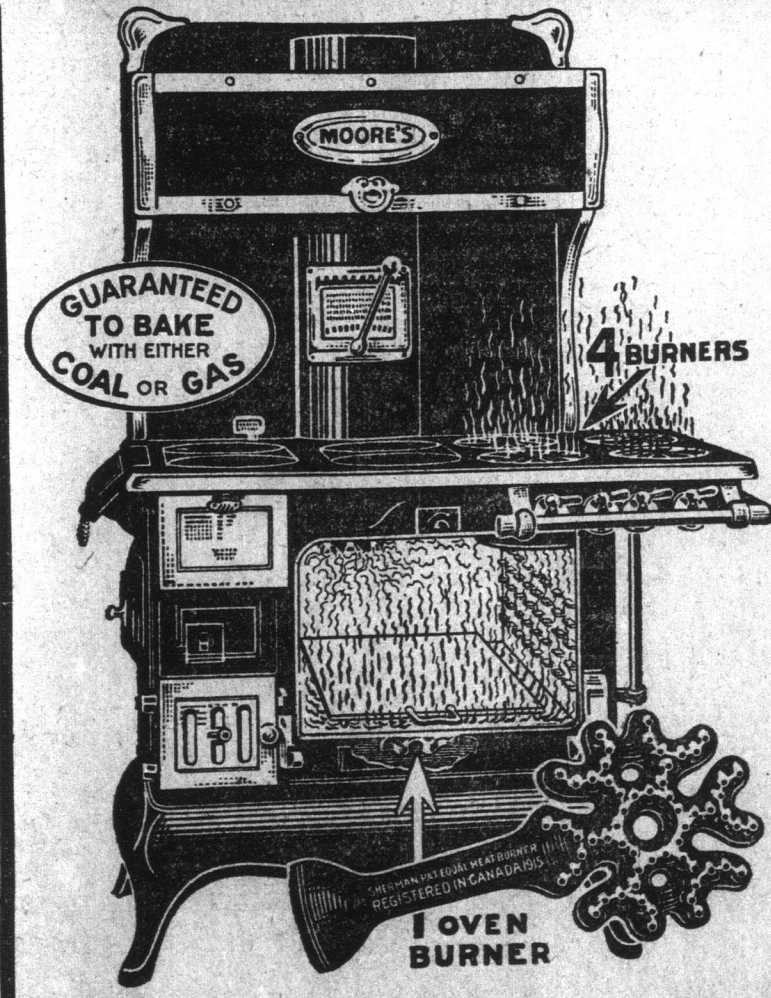
