McGoorty Outweighed.

McGoorty's stand against Beckett was surprising, in view of the fact that he was not trained down fine and that he was not trained down line and that his English opponent outweighed him by many pounds. The American middleweight was a far better boxer than Beckett and landed hard punches, but he simply could not stand up against the tigerish rushes of the English champion. Beckett literally hammered his game

rival into unconsciousness and the crowd gave both fighters a great ovation when they left the ring.

On his showing tonight, however, Beckett would stand no chance against the terrific punching of Dempsey. Townley was a mark for the lanky Fulton, and after the first minute of fightling, during which Fulton was feeling his man, the Yaukee started after his man in earnest and rapidly brought him down with crushing rights and lefts to jaw and body.
