LEAPED SEVENTY FEET Woman Performer Makes Wonderfu

Jump at Scarboro Beach. The second week of the carnival at Scarboro Beach last night was signalized a new thriller, which for sensationalism threw into the shade all of the acts which have grown into prominence during the past few years. The present sensation differs from its predecessors, not only in its originality, but in that nothing is left to chance, the success of the act depending entirely upon the skill of the per-former, Miss Sadie Knownton, a young southern woman, who essays the peril-ous aerial bicycle ride and leap at Scarboro Beach, under the direction of her representatives. This apparatus consists of a tower 70 feet high; be-ginning on a platform at the top of .15 this tower, a narrow runway extends downward in a slanting direction some 11 125 feet. This runway is about two feet wide, and at its termination it curves sharply upwards. Directly underneath this, is a shallow net, and some distance away, a tank of water, Starting from the lofty platform, Miss Knowlton rides her bicycle down the tained by her narrow descent, and the sudden upturn at the finish is precipitaed into the tank, while her bicycle drops unharmed into the net. Miss Knowlton, after leaving her bicycle describes a curve of 90 feet before she reaches the tank.

RUSSIAN-CHINESE COALITION Next Big War in Far East Will Find Them Allies.

VANCOUVER, B.C. Aug. 9.-"Russian offuence in China is steadily regaining the ground which it temporally lost after the war, and in a short time the Muscovite will be stronger than ever in Pekin.
