TEMPERANCE SOCIETIES THROUGHOUT THE PROVINCE.—Halifax, Rev. Mr. Uniacke, President; David Hare, Vice President; J. W. Johnston, Esq. and John Harvie, Sect'rs.—Committee, Rev. M. Richey, Rev. E. A. The first Society in this province was formed at Beaver River, in the county of Shelburne, in Dec. 1828. In April, 1832, it consisted of 114 members. There are also societies in the following places, viz. Nictau, which in April, 1831, consisted of 400 members. Bridgetown, at same date, consisted of about 100 members. Wilnot Mountain. Weymouth, in April, 1832, consisted of 70 members. Yarmouth. Digby Neck. Cornwallis, two or more Societies. Rawdon. Aylesford, July, 1832, consisted of 381 members. Windsor, June, 1832, consisted of 105 members. Guysboro' and Manchester Society, March, 1832, consisted of 321 members. Newport, March, 1832, consisted of 104 members. Musquodoboit, March, 1832, consisted of 60 members. Bay of Islands. Sheet Harbour, June, 1832, 48 members. Pope's Harbour. Londonderry, 1832, consisted of 300 members. Chester, Nov. 1831, consisted of 76 members. Sherbrooke. Bar- ington, May, 1832, consisted of 641 members. Ragged Islands, April, 1832, consisted of 51 members. Lunenburg. Parsboro' April, 1832, 130 members. Truro, Rev. John Waddel, President; A. Miller, senr. Vice President; David Page, Secretary. Shelburne, there are three Societies, one formed in Dec. 1831, which in April, 1832, consisted of 72 members, the other two Societies were more numerous at above date. Preston. Horton, there are three Societies, one of which, some length of time ago, consisted of 197 members. Douglas, April, 1832, 202 members. Cumberland. River Philip.—There are two young men's Temperance Societies distinct from above, although branches of Halifax Society—one in Halifax, the other in Truro. The North's Temperance Society in Halifax, consists of about 100 members, and the meetings are held monthly. Number of members in both Truro Societies, Oct. 1833, 230. The Proprietor of this Almanack regrets that from the want of information, he is unable at present, to give a more minute account of the different Temperance Societies in this Province. As Temperance cause is so highly beneficial to the general interest of mankind, and as its publicity should be as extensive as possible, he respectfully solicits from the Secretaries of the different Societies, by the month of September next, a list of their officers and number of members.
