One Son Killed; Other Wounded

St. John Men Shedding Their Blood Freely for Those at Home; News of the Soldiers

Mrs. John Pinney of West St. John received word on Thursday morning about nine o'clock to the effect that her son, Gordon Pinney, had been wounded and at 10:30 o'clock she received another telegram announcing that another son, Frank C. Pinney, had died of wounds. Both lads went overseas with the 26th Battalion. Gordon was wounded some months ago. Frank was killed on September 18 and Gordon was wounded in the arm and side on the 20th, two days later.

Killed in Action

Word was received last night by Walter L. Doherty of DeMoulin street, West St. John, to the effect that Wendell T. Gray, his brother-in-law, son of the late Dr. T. H. Gray of Fairville, had been killed in action. He went overseas with the 44th Battalion and was later transferred to the 21st Battalion after which he transferred again to the 8th Battalion with which unit he crossed to France. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Ellen Gray of Vancouver; three sisters, Mrs. Walter Doherty of West St. John, Mrs. Albert Menchons of Vancouver, and Miss Muriel, also of Vancouver.

Now Dangerously Ill

A message was received yesterday by Mr. and Mrs. John Magee, of Fairville, stating that their son Private Henry Magee of the 26th (N. E.) Battalion, who was a few days ago reported wounded is now dangerously ill. He is in No. 8 General Hospital at Rouen, France, suffering with gun shot wounds in the head. This is the second time that Private Magee has been wounded, while in discharge of his duties as a soldier of the king.

Private Goodie Wounded

Private Fred Leo Goodie, of this city, has been officially reported admitted to the Fulham Military Hospital in London on September 22 as the result of a wound, fortuitously slight, in his left leg. The news was received yesterday by his mother, Mrs. James Goodie, 245 City road. He is a member of a family which has shown its patriotism in no unmistakable manner, his father being overseas with the 115th, his brother, Benjamin, doing his "bit" with the Army Service Corps and another brother, Bart, with the 140th. The wounded soldier is only 20 years of age. He was employed in a store at Kingsclere, York county before the war. During his stay in England he was married, his wife still residing in England. Since going to the front he has been in the hospital twice on account of illness but has hitherto escaped being wounded.

Artillery Draft

Orders were received recently at the headquarters of the New Brunswick command that another draft of one officer and fifty men would soon be sent overseas from the 6th Field Artillery Depot, now being mobilized at Woodstock (N. B.).

Wounded in Leg

Mrs. E. J. Hipwell, 277 Prince street, West Side, has received word that her brother-in-law, Private Thomas Frederick Hipwell, infantry, has been wounded in the left leg and was admitted to the First Western General Hospital, Liverpool, September 28. He is 24 years old and enlisted with the 26th Battalion.

Now Discharge Rider

Ewart E. Dykeman, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Dykeman of this city, who has been with the Imperial Army Motor Transport service at the front, has been promoted to a discharge rider with the third army.

Wins Military Cross

Lieutenant Ivan S. Ralston has been awarded the Military Cross for gallantry. He is the son of J. Layton Ralston, K. C., of Amherst and M. P. in the Nova Scotia legislature. Lieut. Ralston was one of the finest football players that the University of Dalhousie ever turned out and is also one of the best athletes in the province of Nova Scotia. A short time ago he completed his law course at Dalhousie and immediately enlisted for overseas service.

Church Parades

St. John will have at least two church parades tomorrow, one in the No. 8 Ambulance Train and another for the No. 9 Overseas Heavy Siege Battery, the latter going to Main street Baptist church. It is understood that a number of the men in the composite battery are applying for positions in the overseas battery unit, having grown weary of home defence work.

STRICTER MEASURES AGAINST DESERTERS

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—Two orders in council have been promulgated stiffening the law with regard to the dealing with deserters from the expeditionary forces and with regard to seamen who refuse to obey orders on ships requisitioned for his majesty's service. In the case of soldiers who desert or are absent without leave, it is provided that they may be summarily tried by any justice of the peace, police or stipendiary magistrate, without regard to territorial jurisdiction and sentenced on conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years.

The production of a service roll or attestation paper purporting to be signed by the accused and a written statement from the officer commanding the military district showing that the accused was absent from his corps, shall be deemed a sufficient proof of desertion. In the case of ships of the merchant marine requisitioned for war service it is provided that any seaman who neglects or refuses without reasonable cause to join his ship or proceed to sea or joins in a state of drunkenness, shall be liable to summary conviction to imprisonment up to five years.

Sir Max Not Coming

London, Sept. 29.—(Montreal Gazette Cable)—Sir Max Aitken has cancelled his projected trip to Canada, Sir Sir Hughes, denying that Sir Max had relinquished the post of Canadian representative at the front, said that Sir Max had rendered valuable service to the dominion.

Hon. J. Costigan Dead at Ottawa

New Brunswick Senator Passes Away at Age of Eighty-Two Years; His Career

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—Senator John Costigan, aged 82, died here this morning. He passed away at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Walter Armstrong. The body is to be taken from Ottawa on Sunday for burial at Grand Falls.

John Costigan was born of Irish parents at St. Nicholas (Que.) on Feb. 1, 1832. He was educated at St. Anne's College. He was at one time registrar of deeds for Victoria county and a judge of the inferior court of common pleas. Mr. Costigan was elected to the legislature for Victoria county in 1861, and sat in that house until 1866. At Confederation he was elected to the house of commons for Victoria, and was continuously a member of parliament up to 1904. He became a senator of Canada in 1907.

He became a member of Sir John Macdonald's government in May, 1868, as minister of inland revenue, holding that portfolio until December, 1869, when he became secretary of state in the administration of Sir John Thompson. After the death of Sir John Thompson, Hon. Mr. Costigan became minister of marine and fisheries in the Bowell government, and continued to hold the office in the Tupper regime, resigning with the other members of the government in July, 1896, after the Liberals came into power.

In political life Mr. Costigan always was a strong advocate of the position of Roman Catholics in reference to separate schools, and he was prominent in opposing the New Brunswick school act. He supported remedial legislation for the restoration of separate schools in Manitoba. He was a strong home ruler and regularly moved resolutions in the house of commons for the support of that cause. He was a delegate to the Irish National Convention which was held in Dublin in 1896. His wife was a daughter of J. H. Ryan, of Grand Falls. On his seventieth birthday, Feb. 1, 1902, the Liberal members and senators presented to him a cabinet of cutlery, the presentation being made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. In his later years Mr. Costigan supported the Liberal cause. His home was at Edmundston (N. B.).

Amherst Lawyer Shoots Himself

Amherst, N. S., Sept. 29.—William G. Pugsley, a prominent local lawyer, committed suicide here today, sending a bullet crashing into his brain from a revolver held close to his ear. No cause has been given for the death, but at the inquest held this afternoon the jury returned a verdict that the deceased came to his death by a bullet in the right temple fired by his own hand for reasons unknown.

FIRE LOSS OF \$17,000 AT CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Sept. 28.—Fire this afternoon destroyed the Victoria hotel garage and four automobiles. They included a seven-passenger Russell Knight, a King George auto bus, and a Studebaker, all owned by the hotel proprietor, R. H. Stearns, and a Russell Knight owned by Senator Prowse. Only one car, a Maxwell, which was being exhibited here at the fair, was saved. A quantity of furniture stored by C. P. Fletcher, wedding presents of his daughter, Mrs. Williams, whose husband in the new capital.

The flames spread so rapidly that the contents of the building could not be reached. The total loss will be \$17,000. Senator Prowse's car was insured. Mr. Stearns had a little insurance on the building and on one car only. The auto bus was bought only a week ago. The fire is supposed to have started from short circuiting of electric wires.
