MORE MEN AND MORE MEN

(London Daily Telegraph.) Patriotism, therefore, calls for a big and renewed effort, and we are rejoiced to know that such an effort is to be made.

Some rare articles were sent in by the nobility and gentry of the Highlands. The articles were signed by Robert Burns at Mossiel in 1786. It was presented by the widow of Colonel Leslie Fraser, and was purchased by Captain Dunlop for £24. The collection also included a letter written and signed by Walter Scott—Scottish-American.

THEY ARE VOTING TODAY ON PROHIBITION IN NEWFOUNDLAND

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 4.—The question of prohibition for the colony of Newfoundland was placed before the voters today. The proposed act would forbid the manufacture, importation, or sale of intoxicating liquors after January 1, 1917. The legislature in voting to submit the matter to a plebiscite, stipulated in order to become effective the act must receive not only a majority of the votes cast, but an absolute vote of at least 25,000.

THE VALLEY RAILWAY SUBSIDY EXPIRES

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 4.—The Valley Railway situation has been further complicated by announcement that the federal subsidy expired at midnight on October 3. The duties of J. J. Lieut. Mackey will visit Cape Breton and the miners there. After a very short course of training the men will go to the front. They will then have a special duty of tunneling under the Germans and then exploding mines.

During the last few days several recruits have been coming in from the Havelock district, and a large number of young men from that parish are expected to join the colors and do their bit.
