## Reports on Health Centre Work During 1926 Given At Annual; 20,000 at Clinics

Attendance, totalling nearly 20,000, was made at the various clinics at the Saint John Health Centre during 1926. It was reported at its annual meeting last evening when much satisfaction was expressed with the work carried on by that institution and the organizations associated with it. Dr. G. A. B. Addy, president, was in the chair.

John MacKinnon, honorary treasurer, reported receipts of \$5,879, expenditures of \$4,844.27 and a balance of \$1,034.73. The accounts were audited by P. F. Blanchet. Mr. MacKinnon stated the budget for 1927 was \$8,210. The Health Centre grant from the municipality would be \$1,500, a cut of \$800 from last year's grant.

He said the budget sums were all in view except \$86, which would have to be raised by a tag day or other means.

**BUILDING FUND.**

The fund for the purchasing of the building now amounted to \$1,555.48 and from the recent appeal for life members' contribution to augment this fund, there had been enrolled already. E. J. Henneberry, honorary secretary, reviewed the year's activities, referring to the persistent progress in all branches of the work at the Health Centre and the successful operation of the summer camp for under-nourished children which, to the gratification of the board, had decided to build a permanent club.

He hoped the building fund would be considerably augmented and told of efforts made to this end; referred to the endorsement of the federation of "community welfare work, sponsored by the Board of Trade, and spoke of the board's great loss in the death of Mrs. J. H. Frink.

He referred to the departure of Miss Mary Murdoch, of the Health Centre staff, to an important post in the United States and the entry of Miss

the nurses made 266 visits. At 47 prenatal clinics 52 patients attended a total of 103 times and the nurses made 1,238 visits. At 10 eye clinics, held in a three-month period, 18 patients had an attendance of 52, and 11 were supplied with glasses. At 85 immunisation clinics, 179 patients made an attendance of 616, and had 281 complete inoculations.

The totals showed 1,101 clinics held, 1,966 patients making 19,495 attendances with 15,139 treatments given and 13,084 home visits.

Dr. Addy said the Health Centre and himself, as its president, were to be congratulated on having such able workers as Miss Dykeman and Dr. Warwick.

### DR. MAGEE

Dr. Magee in moving the adoption of the report paid a tribute to Miss Dykeman and pointed out the drop of attendance at the dental clinic from 602 last year to 271 this year, was due to impossibility of having the dentists give their services for the clinics.

Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts also warmly commended Miss Dykeman for the work done, the manner in which the report was presented and the effort and enthusiasm she had displayed.

Dr. M. Hanington, as medical inspector, expressed appreciation of the dental clinic work and told of the wonderfully improved conditions among the school children as regards teeth.

### MRS. E. A. SMITH

Mrs. E. Atherton Smith suggested some volunteer organization might provide the services of a dentist for the dental clinic, if the municipality had cut out the grant for that purpose, and Dr. Addy explained that this service came under the Board of Health, not the Health Centre, and that the Board of Health might be able to find some means of financing a dental service. He pointed out, however, that there were 30 doctors giving daily services at the General Public Hospital without remuneration and that the dentists might be looked to give some public service freely also.


