NAMES OF SAINT JOHN MEN ARE IN FIRST AID LIST

Announcement of Awards in New Brunswick Division, C. P. R., Made

First aid certificates have recently been awarded employees of the Canadian Pacific Railway in the New Brunswick division. Those in Saint John receiving awards were Edmund Wilson and Prescott McLean, of the car department, who received first year certificates; Charles D. Edworthy, of the investigation department, who received second year vouchers.

At McAdam Junction 27 men and 27 women received first aid certificates; at Woodstock, 17 women; at Brownville Junction, Me., 10 men, a total of 39 men and 44 women for the New Brunswick division. Those receiving second year vouchers numbered: McAdam Junction, 11 men and 20 women; Woodstock, three men and 22 women; Brownville Junction, four men, a total of 21 men and 42 women.

Several men have successfully passed the third year examinations and will receive medallions, but as these have to be engraved and registered in England it will be some time before they will be presented.

Up to the present, more than 25,000 persons have received first aid instructions under the Canadian Pacific Council of the St. John Ambulance Association.

MONTREAL FOUNDER HONORED IN FRANCE

100 Canadian Students at Unveiling of Plaque to De Maisonneuve

Canadian Press Cable, Via Reuters. TROYES, France, May 31.—A delegation of 100 Canadians studying at Paris University attended the unveiling of a plaque to De Maisonneuve, founder of the city of Montreal, at the city hall here yesterday.

Leon Gateau, delivering the unveiling address on behalf of the municipality of Troies, appreciated the presence of Mr. Roy, the Canadian representative, who was accompanied by the prefect of Aube, who was representing the French government at the ceremony, and M. Gateau declared their present position was symbolic of the perfect harmony uniting Canada and France. Referring to the attending

Nine Year Old Boy Drowned At Barker's Pt.

FREDERICTON, May 30.—Osborne Savage, 9, son of Irvine Savage, a Canadian National Railway employee, was found drowned this morning in Nashwaak River, half a mile from its mouth, and within a short distance of his parents' home at Barker's Point. The boy disappeared yesterday and last evening troops of boy scouts from Barker's Point and Devon searched for him until midnight along the Nashwaak River and elsewhere. This morning at daylight the search was resumed, and about 8 o'clock the body was found. It is believed that he fell into the water while playing on some logs in the river. Dr. D. W. Ross, of this city, who was summoned as coroner, ruled an inquest unnecessary.

Princess Elizabeth Baptized In Chapel

Archbishop of York Officiates; King, Queen and Prince See Ceremony

Canadian Press Despatch. LONDON, May 30.—Princess Elizabeth Alexandra Mary, daughter of the Duke and Duchess of York, was christened in the private chapel at Buckingham Palace Saturday afternoon at a private ceremony.

King George, Queen Mary, the Prince of Wales, Prince Henry, several other members of the Royal family and a few older servants of the Royal household attended. The ceremony was performed by the Archbishop of York.

This is the first time in history that the private chapel at Buckingham Palace has been used for a christening. The Duke and Duchess brought their daughter by automobile to the palace and were greeted by a large crowd at the palace entrance. The baby's nurse held her to the window that the crowd might catch a glimpse of her.

The little princess wore a christening robe of old lace which has been worn by many royal infants. It was sent by Queen Mary.

Prisoners Freed

American Mining Men Retaken From Bandits By Mexican Troops

LAREDO, Texas, May 31.—Release Saturday of Conrad B. Braden and Jules C. Gallagher, American mining men, after being held captive in Mexico since May 18, was effected by Mexican troops after a skirmish with the bandits, who put up stiff resistance.

A message received by United States Consul Harry M. Walsh of Nuevo Laredo, from Consul Yost at Tuxtepec, said two of the bandits were killed and their leader, Gallo, wounded. Six stolen horses were recovered.

Zagloul Determined To Form Cabinet

CAIRO, May 31.—Lord Lloyd, the new British High Commissioner in Egypt, yesterday had his first meeting with Zagloul Pasha, the Egyptian nationalist leader. According to unofficial reports, the conversation did not lessen the difficulties which have become more complicated recently by the decision of Zagloul to form a cabinet himself instead of permitting Adly Pasha as had previously been arranged to form it.

ADVENTURER WED OVER 100 WOMEN

Bogus Lord Beaverbrook, Under Arrest in Philadelphia—Fleeced Many

LONDON, May 31.—The Standard says today that information received by the Commercial Record Offices indicates that a man passing under the title of Lord Beaverbrook, arrived last week in Philadelphia, and that a man named Alexander Gordon, alias J. J. King, who is "wanted" in London for alleged robbery and bigamy, is identical. Police allege that the man married more than 100 women from many of whom he obtained money.

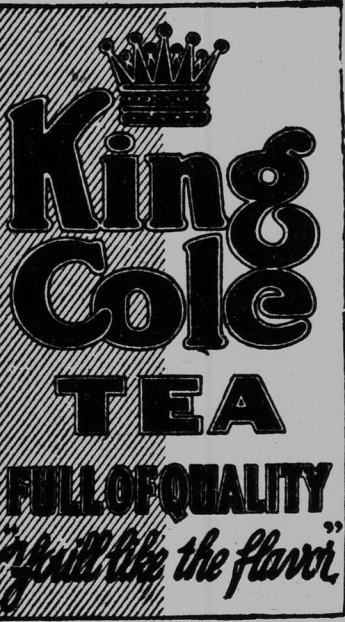
In 1925 he married two women within a few days of each other and disappeared with more than \$20,000 worth of their jewelry, according to the Standard. The paper goes on to say that police want Gordon in Berlin and Vienna on bigamy charges.

BODY OF MURDERED WOMAN IS FOUND

Was Washed Ashore Near Windsor; Indications of Terrific Struggle

WINDSOR, Ont., May 31.—The unidentified body of a slain woman was washed ashore on the Canadian side of Grosse Ile yesterday. The only clues to her identity were inscriptions "Bonnie" on a bracelet and "F. W. A. to G. T." on a ring.

The woman apparently had been killed by a knife thrust in the neck at a point about an inch below the chin. Bruises on the arms and the fact that half the victim's front teeth were missing, have been taken by police as evidence that a terrific struggle preceded her death.
