

CHILDREN HURT AS AUTO FORGED OFF HIGHWAY

Car of Wm. Crowley of Saint John Sent Into Ditch

Two children were injured and two others severely shaken up at 9 o'clock yesterday morning when an automobile driven by Mrs. William Crowley of 75 Sheriff street, this city, was forced off the highway by an unknown car and dived into a ditch below Fredericton. Annie, young daughter of Mrs. Crowley, sustained a fractured arm and William, a little son, contusions to one leg. Two other children of Mrs. Crowley were so severely shaken up that they were in bed today. Mr. and Mrs. Crowley, with their four children, left Saint John yesterday morning to spend the day in Fredericton with Mrs. Crowley's mother, Mrs. Sylvia East. When at a sharp curve in the road, a report today says, a large car of unknown make swung around the turn at high speed, forcing Mrs. Crowley from her own side of the road into the ditch to avoid a collision. The Crowley automobile was overturned, the top torn off and one wheel completely wrecked. After some difficulty Mr. and Mrs. Crowley extricated themselves from the overturned automobile and carefully got out the children. The parents were uninjured though badly shaken up, but the little ones were in such a state that further assistance was necessary.

DID NOT STOP.
The unknown car, which was traveling from the direction of Fredericton, continued its rapid pace without stopping, not even looking back to see what happened the Crowley car.

Other motorists who came along went to the assistance of the Crowley family, took them to the home of Mrs. East, where William and Annie were left until they are able to be brought back to Saint John. Mr. and Mrs. Crowley engaged a taxi at Fredericton and with Rita and Nelly, the other children, came to this city.

The wrecked car has been towed to a garage for repairs.

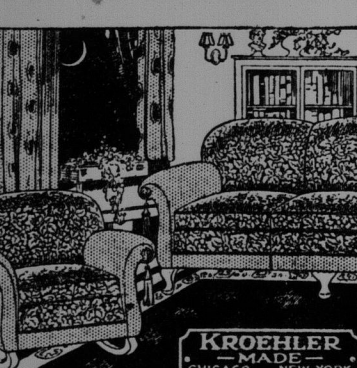
U. S. TEAM CAPTURES WOMEN'S DOUBLES

Browne and Miss Ellarbeth Ryan captured the women's doubles final from Mrs. Kitty McKane Godfree and Miss Evelyn Colyer by the decisive score of 6-1, 6-1. Howard Kinsey, sixth ranking United States player, lost to Jean Borotra, 8-6, 6-1, 6-3 in the final of the men's singles.

AUSTRALIA SHOWS \$12,500,000 SURPLUS

SYDNEY, Australia, July 2—The surplus revenue over expenditure for the Commonwealth of Australia for the 12 months ended June 30, amounts to \$12,500,000 due principally to the financial position of some of the states of the Commonwealth is less satisfactory, most of them having deficits. Of these largest adverse balances is in New South Wales where the deficit is \$75,000,000 which is almost entirely due to the losses on the government railroads and tramways.

out that the government was nine votes to the good.

Mr. Speaker was on his feet, trying to make himself heard above the din, to ask if the House would adopt Sir Henry's motion for adjournment. Members in all parts of the Chamber were on their feet, some shouting and others throwing their paper into the air. At last Mr. Speaker succeeded in raising his voice above the din, and put the motion for adjournment.

LIBERALS JUBILANT

"Carried," shouted ex-Premier King. The deputy sergeant-at-arms, who had been waiting for some time until the hubbub subsided, picked up the mace and escorted the Speaker from the chamber. For some minutes the great hall resounded with the cheering and exultant congratulations of Liberal members, who mixed in groups to discuss the dramatic close of the day's business.

This is the first occasion since Confederation that a government has actually been defeated in the House on a motion involving non-confidence. On three occasions, however, before resigning the King government found itself on the losing side in the House divisions.

Earlier in the session also it suffered a technical defeat on a motion that the chairman do now leave the chair. But this was only a vote in committee. Today's vote was on a motion moved by Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance in the King government, challenging the constitutional right of the acting ministers of the Meighen administration to sit in the House and conduct the passing of supplies.

GOVERNMENT CAUCUS

Premier Arthur Meighen and members of his provisional government gathered in conference at 2.30 this morning after the vote had been announced.

SMALL VOTE EXPLAINED

The explanation of the small vote in this morning's division, 96 to 58, out of a House whose total membership is 184, is that in addition to a number of members of the Opposition, there were 44 members absent with pairs, according to the lists issued by the wings. There were five Progressives away without pairs, in addition to Mr. Kennedy, of Peace River, who was paired. The pair was accidentally broken. There was one additional Conservative and Liberal absent who are believed to have had a private pair.

The Conservative members officially paired were: White (Mount Royal), Fleming, Dr. Chabot, Chertoff, Cotnam, Black (Halifax), Johnston (Cape Breton), Mayhew, Tedford (Waterloo), Messervy, Edwards (Frontenac-Addington), Duncan, Haneson, Burrows, Bell (Hamilton), Callaghan, Langworthy, Charters, Perley, Newburn, Bennett and Bristol.

The Liberals away with pairs were: Morin, St. Hyacinthe, Dubuc, Fontaine, Benoit, Dussault, Lacombe, Baldwin, St. Per, Euler, Macdonald (Prince), LeClerc, Malcolm, Howden, Gershaw, Howard, Desautels, Provost, Goodison, Macell, Towers, Gross and Levesque.

The Progressives away without pairs were Campbell, Carmichael, Levis, Speakman and Ward.

FARMERS NOW HAVE 40 ALBERTA SEATS

Counting of Second Choices Proceeding; Conservative and Liberals Even

CALGARY, July 2—Counting of second choices continues slowly in the electoral districts where the results of Monday's provincial election remain in doubt.

Final results in Wetaskiwin constituency show E. E. Sparks, U. F. A., elected with a majority of 199 over H. J. Montgomery, Liberal. Sparks held the seat in the last Legislature.

Standing of the parties is now: U. F. A., 40; Liberals, 4; Conservatives, 2; Labor, 4; Independent Labor, 1; Incomplete, 7. Total seats 60.

JURY WILL PROBE KIDNAPPING STORY

Post Office Officials Reveal Attempt to Delay Letter Telling of Escape

LOS ANGELES, Calif., July 2—A county grand jury investigation of her kidnapping story instead of a wildly demonstrative throng of 50,000 persons that greeted her week ago, awaits Mrs. Alice Semple McPherson, the fugitive, lat. evangelist and pastor of Angeles Temple, on her return here today, from Douglas, Ariz., according to William H. Carter, foreman of the jury. The crus in the evangelist's mysterious case was reached yesterday when post office inspectors revealed that a letter, carrying what was designed to be substantial proof that the pastor was still alive, had been tampered with in an apparent attempt to cover up the fact that the communication was delivered before and after thousands of dollars in donations in pledges had been made at a memorial service for the man missing.
