### LADY BOUNTIFUL OF CHINATOWN BURIED

Annie Wong's Body Borne to Grave to The Dirges of Five Bands.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Chinatown sped Annie Wong's soul to the home of her fathers with honors never before accorded a woman of the quarter.

For the first time in the history of Chinatown, the Chinese Merchants' Association marched 200 strong behind the coffin of a woman. Men of China do not thus honor the remains of their women folk, but the most powerful and influential of the organizations of Chinatown felt only pride in thus showing their grief at the passing of Annie Wong.

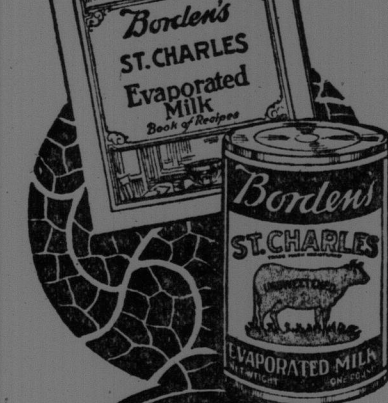
There were seven carriages laden with flowers and five bands, three of them composed of Chinese musicians. Uncountable carriages and motor cars followed the hearse. The cortege wound its way through the tortuous streets of Chinatown, in themselves sufficient to baffle pursuing demons of merely ordinary ability. In addition, the route was white with the scraps of paper which three men tore up and scattered behind the hearse.

This precaution was for such determined devils as might thread the mazes of Chinatown and pursue the coffin to the very grave, except for the bits of paper which, being neat and tidy, such superior devils must stop to gather up.

Upon the grave of Annie Wong was left a feast which in life would suffice her for many days—roast pig and roast duckling and rice cakes and sweetmeats.

She was the wife of Sun You Wong, a merchant living at 95 Mott street. Years ago she was an actress and played at the old Chinese Theatre. It was for her kindness rather than her acting that Chinatown remembered Annie Wong, however. Her husband was wealthy and generous and Annie Wong spent much of her time seeking out trouble in Chinatown and relieving it.

She was buried in Maple Grove cemetery, Queens.

### Robichaud, Gloucester, Only Successful Liberal In N. B.

TEN CONSERVATIVES and one Liberal were chosen by the voters of New Brunswick in the Dominion elections of yesterday. The only supporter of the King Administration returned was J. G. Robichaud, who defeated J. B. Hachey, Conservative, by about 700 votes in Gloucester.

The ten Conservative candidates elected were as follows:

FORMER MEMBERS.  
The result of the election was to return one former Liberal member, Mr. Robichaud, and five Conservatives, Dr. MacLaren, Mr. Jones, Mr. Doucet, Mr. Hanson and Mr. Gimmer. The Conservatives had six members in the last House, the other being Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, who resigned to lead the Opposition in New Brunswick in the provincial elections in August and who since has become Premier. There were four Liberal members from New Brunswick in the last Parliament, W. B. Snowball, of Northumberland, who died suddenly soon after he was selected as the nominee of the party in this election; Hon. Pius Michaud, who was defeated in Restigouche-Madawaska; Hon. A. B. Copp, who has since become a member of the Senate, and Mr.

Robichaud, who won yesterday. The eleventh member was T. W. Caldwell, who sat for Carleton-Victoria in the last Parliament as a Progressive, but who was defeated yesterday when he ran as an Independent Liberal-Progressive.

#### CABINET CASUALTY.

New Brunswick furnished one of the King cabinet casualties in yesterday's election. He was Hon. Dr. W. E. Foster, Secretary of State, who went down to defeat in Saint John-Albert.

The province will have five new members in the next Parliament, namely, Messrs. Bell, Culligan, Flemming and Fish and Dr. Price, all Conservatives.

#### REDS TO TRY TRADERS.

MOSCOW, Oct. 29.—Another severe blow was aimed at private traders in Soviet Russia today when M. Djerjinsky, head of the supreme economic council, acting for the council and the Ukrainian government, directed that numerous officials of the state and co-operative organizations engaged in the sale of textiles should be placed on trial.

### WEST HAS HEAD UP, CURRIES MESSAGE

WINNIPEG, Oct. 29.—"I shall tell the East that the West has got its head up," said Sir Arthur Currie, Principal of McGill University, who is in Winnipeg today on his way to Montreal. Sir Arthur declared that he had discerned a note of renewed confidence throughout Western Canada, and had found not only optimism, but considerable liquidation was in progress, despite the fact that the harvest had not been fully garnered.

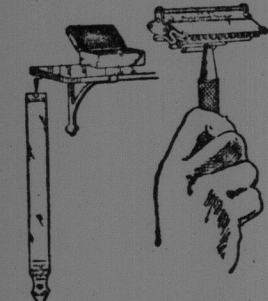
