Local boxing fans, who were interested in the recent bout in Boston between "Jock" Malone of St. Paul, and George Ward of Elizabeth, N. J., were given a genuine surprise when the former battered his way to victory in three rounds. While "Jock" has been winning consistently for some time his victories have not been of an impressive kind. In all lines of sport there are days when contestants are unbeatable. The St. Paul man was fortunate for it was his day and he evidently presented an impenetrable defense and a terrific attack.

Luis Firpo apparently is quite confident that he can win the heavyweight championship of the world when he again faces Jack Dempsey. In a recent cablegram he promises to have "500 per cent. more pep" and also claims that his left arm is improving constantly. The common slang phrase goes "this力士 will" and fans will wonder who Luis has signed as a press agent. It is one thing to threaten to conquer Jack Dempsey, but it is quite another thing to do it. Now that Dempsey has left the power of "Jock" right he will be more wary and be a clever boxer as well as a fighter he should have no difficulty disposing of the South American if they do meet again next year.

Baseball fans are being kept guessing these days. First a report is received that Roger Hornby has been traded to the Chicago Cubs and right on the heels of it comes another that "officials" of the New York Giants are quietly laughing at their rivals. From this it is apparent that they have some inside information about the Cardinals' star second sacker. According to one story Hornby has already been traded to the New York Giants and that McGraw, Branch Rickey and Bill Killefer have in the making one of the biggest deals in the history of the National League. This would indicate that Charles Ebbetts and Barney Dreyfuss are both in possession of some "inside dope" for from recent statements they will under no circumstances do any trading with the Goats.

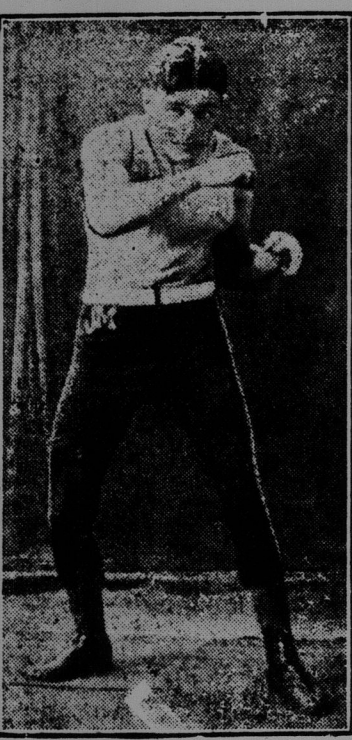

### RACING CAR KILLS TWO MEN

Two Fatalities at Thanksgiving Day Race in California.

Berkeley Hills Speedway, Cal., Nov. 30.—Bennett Hill, driving at 124.4 miles an hour, won the 250-mile Thanksgiving Day automobile race here yesterday. His time was two hours, 18 minutes and 25 seconds. Jimmy Murphy finished second in two hours, 16 minutes and 30 seconds. Eddie Hearne was third.

Two fatalities occurred in connection with the race. George L. Wade, wealthy sportsman of Kansas City, Mo., and Russell Hughes, a news photographer of Los Angeles, were killed when struck by the racing car of Harry Harts as Harts was warming up his car shortly before the start.

In finishing third, Eddie Hearne won the 1923 National speed championship. He had 1,092 points before the race started, and winning third place today gave him an additional 140 points. Jimmy Murphy ends the year's racing season in second place with 1,470 points.

The standing of other nationally known drivers are as follows: Bennett Hill, 923; Harry Harts, 830; Tommy Milton, 810; Harlan Engle, 720.

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### M'INTYRE WON BOUT IN PORTLAND

Defeated "Spike" Hennessey in Well Contested Match.

Portland, Me., Nov. 30.—Johnny McIntyre faced a game and willing foe in Walter Riley of Worcester, recent conqueror of "Spike" Hennessey, here last night and Johnny had a little weight, a little height, a little reach, some experience and quite a bit of class over the Massachusetts warrior winning every round by varying margins. The bout was the final of seven bout card before a big holiday crowd.

McIntyre forced the fighting all the way. Riley met him half way and took all that Johnny had to give without a perceptible slowing up. The New Brunswick boy socked the Worcester lad on the knockout spot several times and sent Riley back but the receiver never faltered, and kept mixing right to the bell. Riley connected with a few clean wallops which seemed to have plenty of power, but failed to check McIntyre's aggressiveness.

The first two rounds were all McIntyre's as was the sixth and last. In the third, fourth and fifth Riley made a good showing, but failed to get an even break in any of them.

McIntyre opened up an old cut over the left eye of his adversary in the opening session, which bled throughout the proceedings, making the battle seem more gory than it was in reality. McIntyre's victory is understood to ensure his return appearance here at an early date against Solly Green of Montreal or Willie Harmon of New York.

### NEW YORK BOXER IS SUSPENDED

Duan Gets 60 Days for Being Overweight.

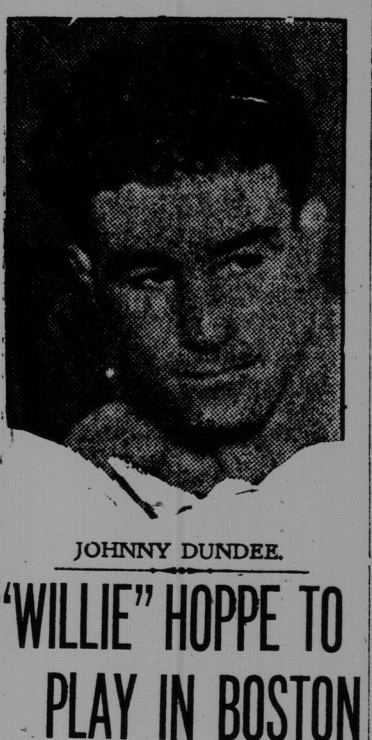
New York, Nov. 30.—Carl Duan, New York boxer, has been suspended for 60 days by the State Athletic Commission because of his failure to make the stipulated weight of 122 pounds for his match last Friday night at Madison Square Garden with Frankie Jerome, also of New York. Mike Valentino, his manager, was set down for a similar period, while Duan was barred from further competition in bantam-weight ranks in this state.

Duan entered the ring against Jerome weighing 127 1/2, an advantage of eight pounds that was a factor in his victory through a decision.

Duan's suspension follows negotiations for a match, with Johnny Dundee, featherweight champion.

### "WILLIE" HOPPE TO PLAY IN BOSTON

Will Compete With Welker Cochran for the World's Title.

New York, Nov. 30.—The challenge match for the world 183 baltline billiard championship will be played in Mechanics' hall, Boston, Jan. 10, 11 and 12, after the "play-off" for the title at Chicago Dec. 17, 18 and 19, the Brunswick-Balke-Collender Company have announced.

Willie Hoppe, the present champion, and Welker Cochran, who finished in tie with him in the international tournament which ended here Nov. 5, will be the principals in each match. The "play-off" is necessary to determine the winner of the tournament, and the loser of the "play-off" will be ranked second in the tournament and, accordingly, has the right of challenging the winner.

Boston was selected because of the attempt made by billiard enthusiasts there to have the "play-off" held under their auspices, but too late after Chicago had been chosen.

"Boston is good enough for me," Hoppe said. "I have played exhibitions there and always received excellent treatment. In fact, I always have played well in Boston and consider it lucky for me."

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### JOHNNY DUNDEE LOST TO SHUBERT

Featherweight Champion Outfought in Ten Round Bout.

New Bedford, Mass., Nov. 30.—Johnny Dundee, featherweight champion of the world, lost the judges' decision in a ten-round bout with Al Shubert of this city last night. There was no title involved. Dundee weighed 132 pounds and Shubert 134. Shubert forced the going and carried five rounds by a good margin and two rounds were even. Shubert, an adept at the lightning game, outscored the champion in this respect. In the sixth round Dundee's flying jab missed its mark, and Shubert sent the champion spinning with a short right. Dundee going down on his hands. In this round Shubert opened a cut under Dundee's eye.
