Everything in Modern Male Wear Exhibited in Madison Square Garden—Clothing Convention.

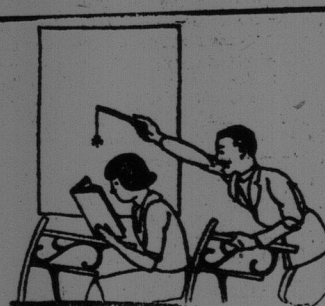

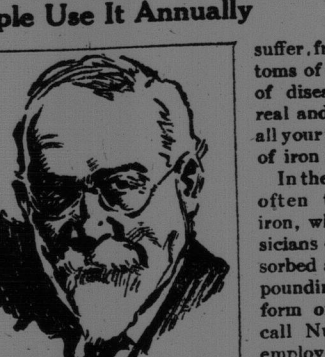
