AUTO TEETERS ON BRINK OF BRIDGE

Hung Precariously Over the Edge After Catapulting Horse and Occupants of Team to Street.

New York, June 8.—An automobile hung precariously over the edge of the Williamsburg Bridge Wednesday afternoon, while its driver, too dazed to help himself, looked blankly twenty-five feet below to the street, to which his machine had precipitated a horse and wagon and its two occupants.

Anthony Barbone, of 7 Old Post road, Massena, Queens, was jogging along toward the Brooklyn end of the bridge with Patrick Perino, of the same address, when the automobile crashed into the wagon. The car was driven by Joseph Barrelli, of 469 Park avenue, Brooklyn, who lost control when the steering rod snapped.

Horse, wagon and the two men were hurled through the railing and fell with a terrific crash into South Fourth street, Brooklyn, between Bedford and Driggs avenues. The front of Barrelli's automobile started over, but the rear wheels caught on the broken railing and halted the car, perhaps saving the driver's life.

Barbone was severely injured. His right arm was fractured, and at St. Catherine's Hospital last night it was reported he was suffering from probable internal injuries. Perino was badly shaken up, but was able to proceed home unassisted. The horse was injured so severely it had to be destroyed.

Patrolmen John J. Qualley, hearing the crash and the cries of those who had witnessed the accident, extricated Barrelli from his dangerous position. Barrelli was suffering from severe nervous shock.

So quickly did a crowd gather that reserves were called from the Bedford street station to keep the people moving. The accident occurred at the beginning of the rush hour.

MOTHER HALTS ATTACK ON CHILD

Saves Shoemaker from Violence, and Detectives Arrest Him.

New York, June 11.—Mrs. Anna Klarer, of 357 East 169th street, the Bronx, held an angry crowd at bay, preventing a mob assault on a man who is said to have attempted an attack on her seven-year-old niece, Bernice Klarer. Coolly arguing against violence, Mrs. Klarer did guard duty in the doorway of a shoe shop, staying the crowd from venting their anger on Michael Conforti, twenty-two years old, of 320 West 114th street.

When detectives at 8 o'clock this week were covering in the store, and they were compelled to draw pistols to hold their prisoner.

Bernice went to a shoe shop, a few doors from her home to have a button put on. A moment later she fled screaming to the street. Passers-by stopped her, heard her story and passed the word along. A thousand angry men and women soon gathered.

Mrs. Klarer, who had run to the shop when she heard the child's screams, was the coolest person in the crowd. She dissuaded the men from breaking windows, urging that the law could deal adequately with the accused man. Detectives of the Tremont Avenue Station shouldered their way in, arrested Conforti and rushed him by automobile to the station house, where, the police said, he confessed.

Deplore Bootlegger Facilities.

"We deplore the existence of facilities under the present law for the carrying on and development of bootlegging between Quebec Province and ad-

joining Provinces and states.

"This conference learns with regret that since the recent repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in certain counties the sale of liquor under unlawful conditions is being continued without any effective effort on the part of the Provincial authorities to stop such illeg-

traffic.

"This Conference deplores the practice of the Quebec Liquor Commission of selling alcoholic beverages on the mail order system, shipping such orders into all parts of the province (wet or dry) through the mails.

Petition Quebec Government.

"This Conference hereby petitions the Quebec Government and Legislature to make provision by an amendment to the present law, by which the commission shall be required to give due public notice regarding all applications for permits or the intention of the commission to grant permits for the municipalities, wards or polling subdivisions."

The report mentioned the notable in-

crease in the number of public dance halls opened up of late in rural sections, many of which are run for commercial purposes and without supervision. It was declared that these were dangerous to the morals of the community. It was suggested that the Methodist Church officials co-operate with local officials in controlling such places, especially in seeing that they were li-

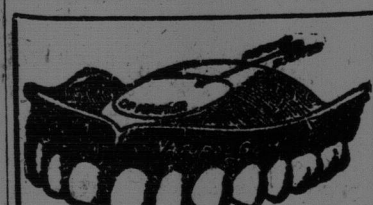
