OVER THE WIRE

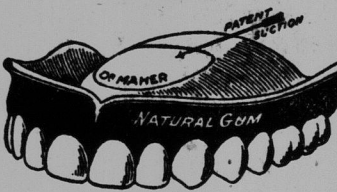

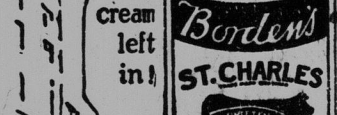

Visited HYDRO WORKS.

About twenty-five members of the Byng Boys Club were the guests of the New Brunswick Construction Company on Saturday afternoon at Musquash.

The man who committed suicide at Mount on Thursday night was identified last night as Warren C. Spurgin, missing president of the Michigan Avenue Trust Company of Chicago. The bank was closed on July 20, when it was discovered to be insolvent to the extent of \$750,000. About \$100,000 worth of liquor was also found in Spurgin's private office.

Mr. B. Hanson was named as the Conservative candidate for York county at the nominating convention at Fredericton on Saturday. Hon. J. B. Baxter was the speaker of the day.

At the Canadian Methodist Mission Board convention in Toronto an appropriation of \$22,945 was granted to New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island conference. In addition \$750 was granted to Grenada towards the building of a parsonage, and \$1,000 to Westfield towards the rebuilding of the church there.

LIBERALS WILL NOMINATE TONIGHT

The convention of the Liberal party in the federal constituency of St. John's, which includes the city and county of St. John and the county of Albert, will be held this evening at 8:15 o'clock in the Moose Hall, Furling street, for the purpose of nominating the party's candidates for the coming general elections. The St. John delegates were selected at primaries held a fortnight ago and half the party will be represented by a complete quota of delegates, who will arrive in the city this afternoon.

BRITAIN WINS BACK EXPORT COAL TRADE

London, Oct. 5.—(Associated Press by mail)—Britain's export coal trade, transferred to the United States a few months ago, owing to the long strike of British miners, is rapidly slipping out of the hands of American traders, according to Board of Trade figures.

"The rapidity with which the international coal trade is reverting to Britain is evidenced in the fact that three months ago the United States was actually exporting coal, not only to the Scandinavian countries, but to England, with distinct leadership in the Mediterranean and undisturbed primacy in South American markets," said Alfred P. Dennis, commercial attache of the American embassy.

"We, today, are practically out of the European trade and are rapidly losing our position in the Mediterranean markets, where we had secured practically half the business with our position as a leading coal exporter in the world."

"On the other hand, production of coal in the United States has still a wide margin for decline."

"The amazing recovery of the British coal industry is shown in trade figures for August which show an export business of more than 3,000,000 tons as compared with 600,000 tons in the preceding month, and 1,847,000 tons in August, 1920."

"This striking reversal in the entire situation is due to the immense quickening of coal production in the United Kingdom, accompanied by falling wages."

The export coal trade is one of the fundamentals in Britain's economic position in world trade and every sacrifice is being made to win back lost ground. Production costs have come down with a run and coal is offered for export at figures approximating production costs.

"On the other hand, production costs in the United States have still a wide margin for decline."

"Fine quality Cardiff coal can now be put on shipboard at thirty shillings, equivalent, at present exchange rates, to about \$8.00 a ton. At normal exchange the price would be \$7.30."

It remains for us to endeavor to maintain our competitive position by bringing down our f.o.b. steamer costs, while at the same time indulging the hope that the future appreciation of sterling may tend to equalize our position, not only in South America but in the major continental markets."

AT ST. PETER'S

The tridium in honor of St. Joseph was begun at St. Peter's church yesterday morning with solemn high mass. Rev. James Woods, C.S.S.R., was celebrant with Rev. D. Coll, C.S.S.R., deacon, and Rev. G. A. Coffin, C.S.S.R., sub-deacon.

The sermon was preached by Rev. James McCandlish, C.S.S.R., of Toronto. Father McCandlish preached again at last evening's services and he will preach this evening and tomorrow evening when the tridium will be concluded.

The three-day services mark the observance of the fifteenth anniversary of the proclamation of St. Joseph as the patron of the Universal church.
