

TIMBER LANDS SOLD BY AUCTION

Property in St. Martins and Simonds Purchased by the Pejepscot Lumber Co. for \$15,000.

Several lots of timber land in the parishes of St. Martins and Simonds, St. John county, comprising between 1,100 and 1,400 acres, were sold at public auction by Auctioneer F. I. Potts at the Club's corner at noon today. The property was put up on a block and was bid in for \$15,000 by Horace H. Tufts for the Pejepscot Lumber Co.
The property sold included the Mile Hill lot, Coburn lot, Clay Field lot, Hill Church Hill lot, half each of the Northwest Marsh and the Southwest Marsh, half share in the Mill Pond lot, the Bell lot, all situated near Ten Mile Creek, and five lots on what are known as the "Barns" on the waters of the parish of St. Martins, situated on the road between Loch Lomond and Quaco. Competition during the sale was confined to three or four bidders.

TO COMMEMORATE RENFORTH'S DEATH

International Aquatic Meet Suggested for Next Year—Labor Day Sports at Renforth—Halifax Invited.

To commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the death of Renforth, who collapsed when his crew was battling with the Paris crew on the waters of the Kennebecas on August 28, 1871, there is a suggested today for an international programme of water sports here next year. An endeavor will be made to call a general meeting of those interested early next year. It is felt that such a meet could not but help to bring back into prominence the sport which occupied the centre of attention half a century ago.
At a meeting of the Renforth Athletic and Quaco Association held last evening a programme of water sports was definitely decided upon for Labor Day at Renforth and negotiations for train accommodation from and to the city are now being carried out with the C. N. R.
An invitation has been extended to the North West Arm Rowing Club and St. Mary's of Halifax, to send entries, particularly for the fours and senior singles. The programme will include senior four oars, novice four oars, senior singles, junior singles, boys' singles, single canoe, double canoe, mixed double canoe and swimming races for men, boys and girls. All clubs are being invited to send entries in for the events before September 1. All events are open.
A real gala day is anticipated. Refreshments will be arranged for on the grounds and the evening will close with a dance in the club house.

SEVEN CRIMINAL CASES ON LIST

Session of County Court Opened Here This Morning.

Seven criminal cases are to be dealt with at a session of the county court which opened this morning. His Honor Judge Armstrong presiding. Included are cases against Joseph Sapier, indicted for breaking and entering the cottages of the late Mrs. J. W. Chapman, and Walter Wall at Duck Cove. He was found guilty on one of the charges this morning. Among the other cases is one against William H. Sharpe arising out of the matter of his suit for the custody of his three children some time ago. Before the court had finally adjudicated upon his claim it is alleged that he sent the three children to the United States and though later he was given custody of them he is charged with a violation in sending them away from this country before he had been given their custody. Most of this morning was taken up with the election of jury and the enquiry by the grand jury into the several criminal cases.
