Lester, chief accountant of the Department of Public Utilities of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, who was engaged to examine the company's accounts and report upon a schedule of rates that would yield the company a return upon the rate base allowed under the law.

The report recommended that the company should charge a straight ten cent street car fare and \$2.50 per thousand feet of gas but, from the directors' knowledge of local conditions, they felt, Mr. Ross said, that a fare of ten cents for a single ride, three tickets for twenty-five cents and fourteen for \$1, would be more popular and yield an equal revenue.
