**BORDEN FAVORS
DISARMAMENT**
Ottawa, Jan. 6.—Sir Robert Borden replying to a request from the New York World for an expression of opinion on disarmament, said: "I sympathize most deeply and earnestly with every reasonable proposal for the reduction of armaments."

TEXAS EXPELS JAPS
Haddington, Tex., Jan. 6.—Two families of Japanese who arrived here last night from the west intended to settle on farming lands were met at the station and informed by a committee that their presence was undesirable. The committee did not make any threats. This is the second demonstration against Japanese here this week. Considerable anti-Japanese sentiment has developed in the Rio Grande valley.

CANCELS CONTRACT
Ottawa, Jan. 6.—From official sources the Journal learns that the government has decided to cancel the contract with Griffiths and Associates because of the long and unnecessary delay that has occurred in presenting some definite recommendations for the reorganization of the post office and the customs and inland revenue departments.

**TEN-CENT FARES
ON STREET RAILWAY
ON MONDAY NEXT**
That the ten-cent fares will be charged by the local street railway was the announcement made by L. R. Ross, president of the New Brunswick Power Co., following a meeting of the directors of the company yesterday.

This decision was arrived at, Mr. Ross said, as a result of a report made by W. V. Lester, chief accountant of the Department of Public Utilities of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, who was engaged to examine the company's accounts and report upon a schedule of rates that would yield the company a return upon the rate base allowed under the law.

The report recommended that the company should charge a straight ten-cent street car fare and \$2.50 for the South End Improvement League's knowledge of local conditions, they felt, Mr. Ross said, that a fare of ten cents for a single ride, three tickets for twenty-five cents and fourteen for \$1, would be more popular and yield an equal revenue.

**TO PURCHASE THE
RED TRIANGLE HUT**
The decision to buy the Red Triangle hut at the Barrack Square for the sum of \$500 was definitely reached at a meeting of the South End Improvement League last evening in the Board of Trade rooms, with the chairman of the league, Thomas Killen, presiding.

A. M. Heusing said that there were three courses open to the league. The first was to drop the matter altogether and leave the league in a dead end. The second course was to take the lease on the building for a term of years and running the risk of losing the building after having equipped it. The last course was to accept the original offer of the Military Y. M. C. A. immediately and close the deal at \$500, so that possession of the building would be an added factor in assuring its present position.

After some discussion it was finally decided to buy the building for \$500. Some doubt was expressed as to the action of the military in the matter of the ground on which the building stands. W. K. Haley drew attention to the fact that Brigadier General A. H. Macdonnell had said that he had no objections to the building being on the present site and that so far as he was concerned, it could be used for the Boys' Club.

The closing of the deal was left in the hands of W. K. Haley. He said that Dr. Haley, chairman had offered to pay for the construction of steps into the building from the Sheffield street entrance. A committee of three, consisting of W. K. Haley, G. N. Hatfield and J. H. Hamilton, was empowered to have stoves installed and the necessary repairs effected in the Red Triangle hut. It was decided to ask the aid of the Girl Guides of Trinity church and of the Boy Scouts in distributing leaflets setting forth the purpose of a canvass for funds.

Frank White made a vigorous protest against the present organization of the South End Improvement League and advocated a meeting in the near future to re-organize, saying that when anyone asked him now the League was getting along he was always at a loss to answer, as he did not know, owing to lack of information through improper organization. The chairman agreed with Mr. White and it was decided to hold a public meeting shortly in the King Edward school, if the assembly hall were available, for the purpose of re-organization.
