### Elder Jensen Says:



### IN BROWN CASE Custody for Examination

DEVELOPMENTS

Prevost Again Taken Into

Prevost, a former close friend of J. Stanley Brown, was again taken into custody for examination yesterday in connection with the death of Brown on Dec. 23. Prevost refused to answer questions, standing on his constitutional rights as he had in refusing to testify at the coroner's inquest. Neither would he discuss the case when confronted by Mrs. Vesley, who yesterday told the authorities a story incriminating Prevost and Mrs. Ruth Brown, the young widow. Prosecutor Wilson last night declined to say whether he would ask for a warrant for Prevost. Such action would be taken, however, he said, if habeas corpus proceedings were instituted.

Beyond accusing Prevost of complicity in the killing of Brown, whose bulletriddled body was found in his automobile on a country road near here, Mrs. Vesler added nothing to her version of the tragedy yetserday. So far she is the only person directly charged with Brown's death. Officials are quoted as saying they believe she was not responsible, but has knowledge that will aid them in clearing up the mystery. The hearing of Mrs. Vesler has been set for Saturday morning.
