#### FOOTBALL.

Dark Spots in British Game.—London, Jan. 29.—(Canadian Press)—The football authorities are anxious to keep the game clear of gambling and the players from book making temptations and scandals, but have a very difficult task. Some days ago a heavy fine was inflicted for circulating football betting coupons without the printer's name and a much more serious case has just been investigated by the association football committee who found as regards the allegations in the recent Portsmouth-Bristol Rovers match that two players of the former club, Hunter and Arnold, had divided £150 paid them by a bookmaker. The offenders have been permanently suspended and a warning arrangement was that the match should be drawn and this actually happened, but Hunter did not play.

One of the surprises in the English cup tie games so far has been the success of the West Stanley from the County of Durham. This team, which arrived in London tonight for the cup match with Tottenham on Saturday, are with two exceptions, working coal miners.

#### AQUATIC.

Standardize Swimming Records.—New York, Jan. 30.—Efforts to bring about adoption of rules which would standardize swimming records have been made by the National Collegiate Athletic Association. Prominent athletic authorities have been asked to offer suggestions. Two faults charged are that the numerous turns in a shorter tank give an advantage in time over a longer tank at the same distance, estimated at one second for each turn, and that in race starts competitors are sometimes given an advantage by a swaying start.

#### HORSE RACING ON THE ICE TRACK.

Mount Clemens, Mich., Jan. 30.—In the Clinton View ice track yesterday, Patrick Todd ruled favorite in the 230 foot, selling for \$1,000 to \$800 for the field. The son of Jim Todd made good, winning the necessary two heats just in time to ward off Lolita, which came with a rush after a bad start in the second heat. Lolita trotted away from the bunch in the final heat, snatching second money from Silent T. Every heat was a race in the 220 pace, Cletia Patchen winning after a battle royal with her stable mate, D. B. J.

#### TIN HATS FOR TORONTO.

Citizen Suggests Steel Helmets for Police Force.

Toronto, Jan. 30.—On the suggestion of a citizen, the Toronto board of police commissioners considered equipping the local police force with steel helmets such as were worn in France. As explained in his letter to the board, the citizen thought that the helmets would be an excellent thing in case of riots to stop missiles such as bottles and bricks, and also to give protection against clubs at close quarters.

On a complaint by another citizen that American promoters were getting the lion's share of the money supposedly raised for soldiers and their dependents by professional boxing bouts, the commissioners considered either stopping the bouts or demanding from the promoters a statement showing receipts and expenses. The commissioners pointed out that professional boxing bouts had not been allowed in Toronto, and were tolerated only on patriotic grounds.
