REPORT ON INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS

Ottawa, July 1.—Sir Robert Borden in the house this morning tabled the majority and minority reports of the Commission on Industrial Relations. The majority report which is signed by Judge Mathers, Carl Riosse, Charles Harrison, Tom Moore and John W. Bruce, recommended legislation for a maximum work day of eight hours, with weekly rest of not less than twenty-four hours; minimum wage, especially for women, girls and unskilled labor; also government action to relieve unemployment through public works, to help the building of workers' houses, to restore fullest liberty of speech and press, and to establish a bureau for promoting industrial councils to improve relations between employers and workers. Immediate inquiry by experts is suggested with a view to early legislation as to the system of proportional representation in parliamentary elections; also state insurance against unemployment, sickness, inability and old age.

Conference Suggested.

Other general recommendations are: Collective bargaining, payment of living wage, right of workers to organize, recognition of unions, steps toward establishment of joint plant and industrial councils to protect workers, child extension of opportunity to reach highest educational institution; also that the commission's findings be put into effect in all work controlled by government, where the principles of democratic management can be applied. That the report and evidence be printed for general distribution; and that if the Dominion parliament has not power to legislate as proposed by the commission, a conference of premiers and other representatives of the provincial governments, also representative labor men and employers, be called in Ottawa in order to reach unanimity on such points, and also to unify present provincial and Dominion legislation bearing on relations between employers and employees.

Owing to unsettled conditions, the commission found everywhere a great reluctance to risk unemployed capital in new enterprises or the expansion of existing ones.

The high cost of living was assigned as one, if not the chief cause of labor unrest, which would largely disappear if living expenses more nearly balanced wages. At present any advance in wages is invariably met by an increase in price of prime necessities of life, which many people believe is due to profiteering chiefly through cold storage plants which interest food supplies.

They also blame the present expensive system of distribution and declare there are too many middlemen. The commission notes with pleasure that this matter is being investigated by a special commission in parliament.

The minority approves of the labor declaration in the peace treaty, that "labor should not be regarded merely as a commodity as an article of commerce."

Ottawa, July 1.—The industrial commission, majority report, sets out that the commission believes that in Canada a beginning should be made with joint plant councils and more extensive organizations of districts and national councils evolved therefrom as necessary arises.

They suggest the following as suitable subjects to be dealt with by the council: Wage rates, hours of labor, plant conditions, such as safety, ventilation, light, sanitation, provision for meals, dressing rooms, shelter, etc.; child and woman labor; questions of discipline and conduct as between management and work people; questions of discipline and conduct outside the plant, such as education, amusement, recreation, health, housing, apprenticeship or special training, libraries, etc.; improvement in the plant or provision of new plant; increase production, decrease waste, etc., and rewards to those who suggest such improvements.

Every council or by whatever name it may be known, must be the result of the unfettered choice of both the employer and the employee concerned. Any attempt to force a definite plan upon either would be foredoomed to failure. Successful machinery should, however, be established to take the initiative and bring the parties together.

The commission recommends that the Dominion government should interest itself in the development of these councils, and that a bureau should be established under the minister of labor which would compile all available information on statistics, undertake publication of developments in this and other countries and maintain officers who would act as liaison between employer and workers where desire is expressed to create such councils.

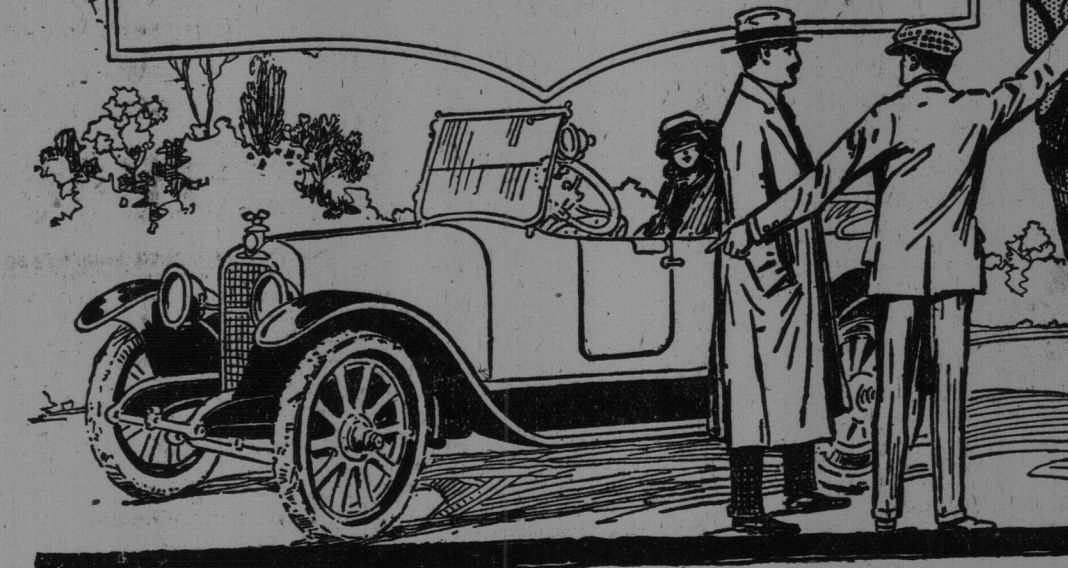

THIRD READING FOR HARBOR BILL

Ottawa, July 1.—The St. John harbor bill was considered in the house this afternoon and given its third reading. It went through the house with very little inquiry or explanation. In answer to some questions by the leader of the opposition, the minister of marine said there was a small portion of new ground taken in at Courtney Bay. It is expected that the whole work will be completed in eighteen months. There will be three harbor commissioners appointed who will be prominent business men. Their names have not yet been decided. Their remuneration will be decided by order-in-council, and it will probably not be as large as the salaries paid at Montreal, as the duties will not be so heavy. The estimated revenue under the commission, it is said, is estimated at \$225,000 a year.

Owing to the manifest impossibility of clearing the accumulation of legislation which parliament has before it, a conference was held today between the government and the opposition with a view to arranging some sort of legislative modus operandi and proroguing the house on Saturday. With this object in view it was arranged that the highway bill be the bill for a purchasing commission, and the bill dealing with military defaulter will be dropped for this session.

Everyting contained on the order paper which the opposition takes strong exception to will be removed. The bill relating to the high cost of living, inland revenue act and the by-elections will be proceeded with, the understanding being that arrangements satisfactory to the opposition have been arrived at on the latter. It is probable, therefore, that prorogation will take place on Saturday.

The report of the H. C. of L. commission, which will have developed against the proposed appointment of W. F. O'Connor as chairman of the new body, Sir Robert Borden, Sir Thomas White and Sir James Loughheed are said to be determined that he will not be appointed. A bill has been introduced to make permanent the positions given temporary mail clerks. In the west during the recent strikes.

Mr. Nicholson moved concurrence in the appointment of a board of commerce. A motion by D. D. McKenzie to have the report of the committee of which Mr. Nicholson was chairman referred back to them was defeated.

PRESBYTERY ON HIGH COST OF LIVING

At the quarterly meeting of the Presbytery of St. John yesterday in St. Andrew's church a resolution was passed and sent to Premier Borden asking that the government take steps to rectify the causes of the high cost of living in Canada. It urged that all business profits in excess of a reasonable percentage be turned over to the Dominion treasury. Another resolution was passed calling upon the senate to uphold the house of commons' action on prohibition. Rev. James Ross was nominated moderator of the autumn synod in Fredericton.

Rev. M. J. McPherson, new moderator, presided.

The resignation of the Rev. H. C. Fraser of Knox church was regretfully accepted.

In accordance with the ruling of the general assembly, that the minimum salary of all Presbyterian ministers be \$1,500, with full use of manse, the Presbytery ordered the home mission committee to take steps to have this new rate become effective at the earliest possible moment in all congregations paying less than that amount.

The induction of Rev. George Gough, Scotch Ridge, was set for Tuesday next in St. James' church, Scotch Ridge. Rev. W. W. Malcolm to preside; Rev. A. T. W. Black to read the minister and Rev. Mr. Ross was chairman of the committee.

All the clergy recently inducted were asked to comply with the law of the church by signing the formula prescribed for Presbyterian ministers.

In a rear-end collision on the New York Central Railway near Dunkirk, N. Y., yesterday, eleven persons were killed and nineteen injured.

SCANDANAVIAN IN WITH 1313 PASSENGERS

Montreal, July 2.—Bringing 1,818 passengers, of whom many had landed at Quebec yesterday morning, the Scandinavian docked last night. There were 515 cabin passengers, including forty-nine military, 131 dependents and 833 civilians. The third class numbered 798, including 253 military, 477 dependents and sixty-six civilians, all of whom landed at Quebec. The troops carried were Canadians who had been in the imperial forces, the majority in the Royal Air Force.

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FOREST FIRES IN NORTH ONTARIO QUITE SERIOUS

Englehart, Ont., July 1.—In the continued absence of rain, a serious situation is fast developing from bush fires north from this place to Cochrane and along the Transcontinental. The bush is burning vigorously in many places. The most serious damage has been done in the district from Porquis Junction north and west, and at Hatter, some several miles out of Cochrane, the section has other outbuildings and 10,000 cords of pulp wood have been destroyed. No ill have been lost so far as is known.

GERMANS STILL IN RIGA

Copenhagen, July 1.—A telegram to the official Lithuanian Bureau from Libau says the report of the evacuation of Riga by the Germans is premature. General von Der Goltz has established himself in Riga. He has proclaimed himself governor general and has appointed Major Arnim, a German, governor of Riga.

Advices from Libau to the Lithuanian Press Bureau on Monday were that Lithuanian troops were within nine miles of Riga and that the Germans were evacuating the city.
