These aliens should be credited with the standard wages. The government, after deducting a sufficient amount for the food, clothing and up-keep of the prisoners are to hand the surplus over to patriotic societies for the benefit of widows and orphans.

The passing of the new draft treaty between Canada and the United States whereby a large number of additional men for military service are being secured was hailed with satisfaction by the Grand Lodge.

It was also announced that the British government have also been asked by the lodge to complete the treaty which is now under negotiation with the allied countries so that men in Canada and elsewhere in the British Empire fit for military service go back to their own country and enlist; if not they will be enrolled in the Canadian Army.
