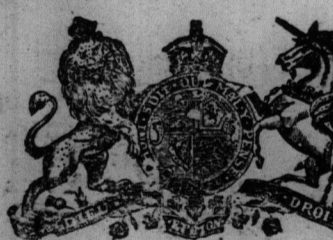

This shall be known as "Newfoundland Time," and shall be applicable to the whole colony.

## NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

Postal Telegraph Offices are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and five cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraph Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.  
A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.  
To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.  
Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.  
Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the message may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

## Terrible Train Accident

14 Year Old Boy May Lose Both Legs. Falls under Moving Cars in Attempt to Steal Ride.

(Evening Herald, July 31.)  
Edward Hurley, 14 years old, of Patrick St., was the victim of a terrible accident at the Reid Co's. railway yard at 9:45 last night and now lies in a precarious state at the General Hospital where one of his legs has been amputated and the other is badly mangled that it may be found impossible to save it. The shore train had arrived a few minutes previously and as the cars were backed down from the station and being shunted on to the siding, the moving cars, but between two cars, his legs going directly across the rail. The front truck of the car following the one he tried to board went over his legs, leaving one barely hanging and frightfully mangled the other. Driver Kelly, who was doing the shunting with engine 165 heard the car bump and immediately applied the air and ran back to see what was wrong. He found Hurley beneath a car in a pool of blood and unconscious. He was picked up and brought into one of the cars where all possible was done for him till Dr. Anderson who had in the meantime been telephoned for, arrived on the scene and ordered the injured lad to the Hospital where he was taken in the ambulance. As soon as he reached there the right leg was amputated and it is feared that the other will have to be taken off. He is doing as well as can be expected but the case is a very serious one.

## Roumanians Fine Work and Captures

London, July 24.—A Roumanian official, dated Thursday, has been received here. It announces the capture of Teutonic allied positions on a front more than 18 miles and a death of more than nine miles, also taking additional prisoners, guns and munitions. The statement says:—We have widened northward the breach in the enemy's front and captured the whole of his positions on a width of 30 kilometres to a depth 15 kilometres. We have taken 1,245 prisoners, captured two batteries of howitzers, nine guns and a quantity of munitions.

### Newfoundland Patriotic Association Employment Committee

The Employment Committee has been appointed by the Newfoundland Patriotic Association "to take into consideration applications for employment in civil life from returned Soldiers and Sailors of the Newfoundland Regiment and Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve who have been granted honourable discharges." The Committee can only perform this duty to our returned soldiers and sailors with the fullest help and co-operation of all those in the Colony who employ labour or require help or service of any kind in which these men may be employed. The Committee will prepare and keep on file a register of all men seeking employment, giving their names, addresses, etc. This information will be available to prospective employers, and steps will be taken to bring about interview or correspondence between employers and soldier or sailor applicants. Every person or firm when requiring such help for either domestic or business purposes is therefore invited to communicate to the Committee the nature of the help required, and of the work to be done, and such other information as may be useful.

For the present the Headquarters of the Committee are at the Colonial Building, St. John's, and communications should be addressed to A. E. Parsons, Secretary of the Employment Committee.
