Russell, J. P., who referred to the object of the meeting and to our Naval Reservists on board the Niobe. On the platform with him were Rev. Canon Field, Rev. Oliver Jackson, Adjt. Ellsworth, S. A., Mr. John Jardine, J. P., Naval Reservist Jack Parsons and William R. Dawe. The programme consisted of speeches, choruses, recitation, and gramophone selections by Roy McLeod. Rev. Oliver Jackson delivered a stirring speech on the work of the British Navy and Army and the principles for which we are fighting. Rev. Mr. Jackson has three brothers at the front, one of which is a twin brother. He was followed by Mr. Gus Parsons, who gave a splendid recitation, entitled, "The Last Charge." Adjt. Ellsworth, S. A., followed with a short address on the work of the Patriotic movement in Newfoundland.

The next item on the programme was the presentation to Jack Parsons of two pairs of socks and a safety razor. Wm. Dawe was also presented with two pairs socks. Jack Parsons in accepting the presents thanked the ladies and others for their interest in him.

Official

The Governor, Newfoundland:
London, Sept. 15.—The French Government report only artillery duels.

The Russian Government report German pressure continues west of the Dvinsk railway. Near Podbrodzio on the Petrograd line, the enemy has been repulsed. Offensive successful at various points in Galicia. Some twelve thousand prisoners in all captured. During the last fortnight the Russians have captured over forty thousand prisoners.

Meigle's Report

The biggest kind of codfish are now being taken all along the Labrador side of the Straits of Belle Isle, and the real old time "Labrador" herring are numerous, such is the report brought here by the S. S. Meigle, Capt. Goobie, which ship reached Curling yesterday morning from the Straits of Belle Isle. Capt. Goobie reports a good sign of cod from Cape Head to Port au Choix, but bait is scarce. At Port au Choix and other parts of the Labrador side of the Straits trawlers get from one to two qds. codfish a day, and single hand fishermen at Forteau get as high as three qds. The fish are enormous size. The S. S. Meigle took away from Blanc Sablon 8,400 qds. cod. She sailed for St. John's on Wednesday to finish loading for the Mediterranean market, and the same day Baine Johnson & Co's vessel, with 4,000 qds. cod, sailed from Battle Hr. for Gibraltar, this is the first cargo for the season. This firm has another vessel partly loaded, and expects to ship a third cargo. The Meigle reports stormy weather throughout the voyage, and on her trip south found it impossible to handle freight at several places along the coast. A number of fishermen returned by her.—Western Star.

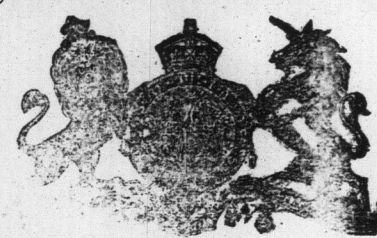

Public Notice

Passports

Residents of this Colony, intending to travel out of Newfoundland, are hereby notified that they may be required to produce Passports at various points on their journey.

Passports are issued at the Department of the Colonial Secretary, in accordance with Rules and Regulations approved by the Governor in Council, to persons domiciled in Newfoundland, who are:—

1. Natural-born British subjects;
2. The wives and widows of such persons; or
3. Persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, in the British Colonies, or in India.

A Passport cannot be issued on behalf of a person already abroad; such person should apply for one to the nearest British Mission or Consulate. Passports must not be sent out of Newfoundland by post.

Applicants are requested to have their Forms of Application (which can be obtained at this Department), properly filled in, according to marginal instructions thereon, and forwarded to the Department in sufficient time to permit of any necessary alterations being made in the same before the date upon which the Passport would be required.

The charge for a Passport is \$2.50, which covers a period of two years, after which it may be renewed for four further periods of two years each, at a charge of \$1.00 for each renewal.

Copies of Rules and Regulations, Forms of Application, or any desired information may be obtained upon request.
